The Mayoralty Contest.

The results of the elections yesterday, so far as the Mayoralty is concerned, are disappointing. It is difficult to justify the choice of the electors, but they have made the choice, and whether right or wrong it is the duty of all to abide by it. They have seen fit to select the inferior man, They had a chance to have as Mayor nine years a faithful alderman, the son of a stalwart British soldier; a man who by industry and sound business methods has won success. He would worthily have occupied the

Mayor's chair. We know no reason for the mistake the electors have made, except it may be that they have been misled by the exaggerated claims made by Mr. Beck. His claims as to the money alleged to have been saved by him at the hospital, and the faults he charged against the Trust, without foundation, as they were, have evidently been believed by some. It is always difficult to meet a statement half a falsehood and half the truth. He failed to explain that the boilers, etc., the building without escapes, etc., were, if wrong, the fault of the building committee of the Council, not the fault of the Trust. He failed to tell that the trust had fire escapes on the old building. He failed to explain that the question of coal was brought up by Mr. Gilmour before Mr. Beck was a member of the Trust, and was under discussion by the Trust when Mr. Beck became a member; that Mr. Gilmour predicted the abolition of the heating system when it was first introduced. These are samples that go to show a temporary advantage may be gained by pretending to be entitled to credit where no more credit was due to him than to any other member

of the Trust. Mr. Parnell has no reason to be ashamed. He polled a splendid vote, an honest vote, not one obtained by making claims for credit where no credit was due. It is a pity that he will not be in the council, as his

steadying hand may be much needed. The aldermen elected are, however, many of them good men. They may be able to direct Mayor Beck's course, to curb him when he would go astray, to be his teachers; for we doubt not that around the board there will be several to whom he will find it wise and necessary to look for advice; several who could, more capably than he, fill the position to which he has been elected. We would have been pleased naturally there was enthusiasm if Mr. Parnell had been the people's among their supporters. choice; but as he has not been, we recognize the right rests with them to make the choice, and to bear the responsibility of that choice when made.

The Hospital Trust-Mr. Isaac Waterman Elected by a

Large Majority. Mr. Waterman might have been elected by acclamation, but for the attack made by the Free Press on ex-Mayor Rumball. The fact that ex-Mayor Rumball did not want to run was well known by the electors, and

probably influenced many votes. We believe Mr. Waterman will make a good trustee. We do not believe he was a party to the libels and slanders hurled at his opponent and at the Trust generally. He went to Buffalo on business on the day of the nomination, andwas called to Rochester by the illness of his sister. He did not return to the city till Friday, so that personally neither he nor ex-Mayor Rumball

took much part in the campaign. This is the first time politics have been introduced into the hospital. That honor belongs to the Free Press. We do not believe that Mr. Waterman will keep them there. We believe he will say it is the last place in which politics should be introduced, and join with the chairman, Mr. Thomas Mc-Cormick, and the other members of the Trust, to do his best for the welfare of the hospital. He has already shown his interest in the hospital by furnishing a room in memory of his daughter, whose untimely death was

mourned by everyone. There will, we feel sure, be nothing but good attempted by him, and we are equally sure that had there been an opportunity for Mr. Rumball and
