This statement brought forth great applause. WON'T BACK DOWN.

St. Paul, Minn., Jan. 30 .- Governor Van Zandt replied to the petition from Minneapolis business men, who asked him to cease his fight on the so-called railway merger. In the letter declining to comply with the request, the governor quotes the state law, which rohibits the consolidation of competprohibits the consolidation of competing lines of railway. The so-called consolidation of the Northern Pacific and the Great Northern Companies, through the organization is, in his opinion, clearly a violation of the law, which, he says, it is his sworn duty to enforce.

GOOD FOR WINNIPEG. Winnipeg, Jan. 30 .- The Canadian Northern Railway has reached a decision to build all rolling stock possible in Winnipeg. The road is well equipped. The net earnings of the company last year were \$403,000.

CONSOLIDATING TWO SYSTEMS. 
