The question of whether speeding is
permissible on Dufferin avenue was
brought up yesterday at a meeting of
the police commissioners, when it was
discovered that the Ontario statutes
allowed no city of less than 100,000 in-
habitants to apportion a street for
racing. As a result the Amateur Road
Drivers' Association has announced
that there will be no speeding for the
present. It is understood that an effort
will be made to have the act changed
at the next meeting of the Legislature.

**Tiling of Carling's Creek
Will Cost \$25,000 at Least**

**Engineer Graydon Makes an Es-
timate for Board of Works**
—City Hall Repairs.

The board of works met last night,
Chairman Forristal, Ald. Gerry and
Garritt, City Engineer Graydon and
Secretary Bell being present. Ald. Wy-
att, being slightly indisposed, was un-
able to attend.

The board discussed the West Lon-
don breakwater, but allowed all mat-
ters pertaining to it to lay over until
next week. In accordance with the re-
quest of the council the estimates for
the year will be prepared without de-
lay, and in discussing this matter the
aldermen voiced their determination to
ask for plenty of money for all pur-
poses, so as to avoid overdrafts such
as those of the past two years.

Engineer Graydon reported the til-
ing of Carling's Creek, as follows:

"The total length of the required to
be laid in this watercourse from Tal-
bot street to Dundas street east is 8-
400 feet. The tile will cost \$2 a foot
or \$1,680. It will cost 50 cents a foot
to lay the tile, or \$4,200, and the cost
of filling in will be about \$4,000, the
whole work costing \$25,150.

"The frontage to be benefited along
the creek is about 11,231 feet, equal to
a cost of \$2 25 a foot frontage, or
\$25,290. The tile will cost \$2 a foot

"The assessment commissioner also
presented a list of property-owners on

**Tiling of Carling's Creek
Will Cost \$25,000 at Least**

following repairs and improvements to
the city hall are necessary:

The counter in the city clerk's office
to be moved back and a glazed railing
placed across a portion of it, so as to
make a private office for the clerk.
The Charity Organization office to be
replastered, ceilings repaired, room re-
papered and a chair-rail put along the
walls.

The relief officer's office requires to
be replastered and the woodwork re-
painted.

The retiring room for the aldermen
on the south side of the council cham-
ber requires either a new carpet or a
new linoleum, and should have a sofa
and half a dozen easy-chairs.

The state roof of the city hall re-
quires to be repaired. The south hall-
way also needs to be replastered and
the hallways and walls of the first
and second floors need repainting.

Mr. Graydon was empowered to call
for tenders for the work, and to as-
certain the cost of articles needed, and
to report to the board at its next meet-
ing. He was also given authority to
make certain much-needed alterations
to the engineer's office.

The board will visit the registry office
to see what can be done toward put-
ting the building in proper shape for
Registrar Dignan, it being agreed that
something will have to be done with
the building at once.

It was decided to recommend to the
council that the claim for damages of
Mrs. Elizabeth Mitchell be filed, the
engineer stating that she has no legal
claim on the city.

The petition of John Hyatt, et al.,
for a cement walk and curb on the east
end of the block of Hyatt street, be-
tween Hill and Grey streets, was grant-
ed and the work will be advertised
in the usual manner, the petition be-
ing sufficiently signed.

The request of George W. Arm-
strong for permission to erect a sign
in front of his brass works on Carling
street was referred to the engineer.
