The farm is high and dry, and the ditch is no use to me, but it has filled up and will not carry off water from farms above me, whose owners want me to open it, and I have been served with a notice that the engineer will be at head of drain. What am I to do?

Ans.-You must attend before the engineer and state your contention to him. The matter is to be determined your land you should not be compelled to bear any part of the expense of cleaning it out, but if it does it will be the duty of the engineer to decide whether you should bear the whole or ditch through your farm.
