MAIZE FROM SOUTH AFRICA

London, Sept. 16.—A striking fact in the history of the grain trade for the world is the recent rapid increase in exports of maize from South Africa. It is not long since the South African farmers began to realize the possibilities of maize growing and the great value of this grain in the markets of Europe. Experts on this continent pronounced the South African maize to be of the finest quality, and agriculturists found that the South African climate and soil were particularly favorable to the growth of the cereal. This year there has been an unusually large harvest, and owing to the fact that the natives have grown large quantities of amahle, or Kaffir corn, they were not such extensive buyers of maize as in former years. As a result, the Hon. P. R. Moor, the prime minister of Natal declared in a recent speech, 240,000 tons of Natal maize will be shipped to Europe between now and December next. The Transvaal has considerably over a million bags of the cereal available. So great has been the output that the Natal railway has been unable to cope with the large consignments forwarded to each roadside station for transit to Durban.

In the Siamese class, Mrs. H. G. Dykhouse showed a very unique cat, cream in color, with brown ears, feet and tail. It was awarded two firsts in different classes.

A special code of bylaws is being prepared. It is understood, and these regulations, if enforced, will make the citizens observe the ordinary precautions.

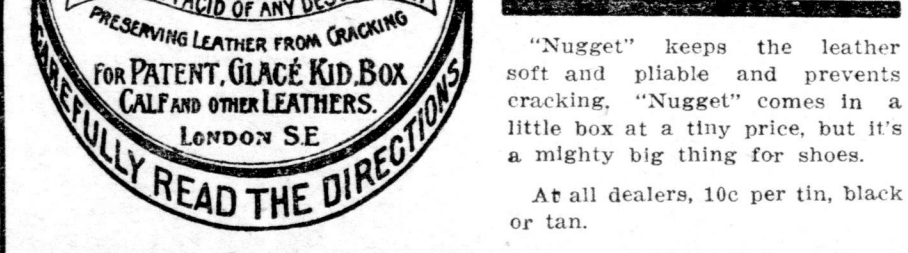
