

MAN LEAPS 375 FEET TO DEATH ON STREET

Sensational Suicide On a Crowd-
ed Thoroughfare of New
York City.

New York, Dec. 7.—An view of thou-
sands of pedestrians on Park Row and
City Hall Park late yesterday after-
noon, an unidentified man jumped to
death from the towering dome of the
World building, 375 feet above the
street. The human form came hurtling
down through the air with terrific force
and crashed into the motor hood of an
automobile standing in front of the
entrance to the building, narrowly
missing the chauffeur. The body was
completely mangled, and the forward
portion of the motor car was crushed
by the impact. The name "Albert
Paris" and a card bearing the name
of a physician in Jersey City were the
only clues by which to trace the man's
identity. He was apparently about 50
years old.

HIS QUOTATIONS WIN HIM FREEDOM

Prisoner Doesn't Cite Law to
Court, But Talks Language
of Poets.

Detroit, Dec. 7.—Quotations from the
poets, past and present, won liberty for
James Dickson, student and philosopher,
who had modestly registered as simple
"poet," when arrested on a charge of
disturbing the peace, in Justice Stein's
court yesterday.

Dickson made an eloquent plea for free-
dom. "I beseech your honor," he said, "not
to cause my imprisonment on this charge
and thus take away my reputation as a
poet."

"He who steals my purse steals trash;
Twas here, 'tis there, 'twas mine,
'tis his, and has been slave to thousands."

"You are a scholar," asked the
judge. "Yes, if it please your honor. A
humble poet, a student and a quiet philo-
sopher. And, sir, I long for a breath of
the fresh air of heaven again. I long
to walk under the blue dome of that
interior bowl we call the sky. My
spirit chafes at this confinement. I did
not mean lightly of the flowing bonnet
and stole away my brain."

"Can you read a few of your own lines
for our edification?" queried Justice Stein.
"It is pleasing to your honor. I
would be happier in speaking the words
of another. One of the minor poets
proclaims them, but they are none the
less worthy for that."

"Indeed," said his honor. And James,
striking an attitude and raising his hand
for silence rolled forth the following:
These are the things I hold of dearest
worth:

Light of the sapphire skies, peace of the
silence of the night,
Shelter of forests, comforts of the grass,
Songs of the birds, music of the turf,
Shadows of clouds that swiftly pass;
The rustle of leaves in the softened light
Of the sunset glow; the stars at night;
The rainbow sheen, the summer flowers;
And when I close, the smell of flowers;
And of the good, brown earth.

But best of all, along the way,
Friendship—and mirth."

BIG DECREASE IN CONTAGIOUS DISEASES

Marked Falling Off in Infantile Par-
alysis, Typhoid and Scarlet
Fever.

Toronto, Ont., Dec. 6.—Dr. J. W. S.
McCullough, chief health officer of the
Province, stated that there had been
a marked decrease of the three con-
tagious diseases, infantile paralysis,
scarlet fever, and typhoid fever, there
were only three cases of infantile paralysis,
none of which were fatal, compared
with 21 cases and 5 deaths in Novem-
ber, 1910. Last month the scarlet fever
returns were 167 cases and 4 deaths,
as compared with 240 cases and 15
deaths in November, 1910.

For typhoid there were 103 cases
and 12 deaths, as against 226 cases
and 50 deaths for November a year
ago. There were 72 cases of tuber-
culosis and 40 deaths, while for the
corresponding month last year there
were 105 cases and 53 deaths. Dr. Mc-
Cullough points out that the tuber-
culosis returns are not sufficiently ac-
curate for purposes of comparison, as
notification of this disease is not com-
pulsory. The contagious diseases last
month totalled 722, and the deaths 85,
as compared with 1,077 cases and 161
deaths in November, 1910.

DIDN'T KNOW IT WAS POISON.

New York, Dec. 7.—The coroner's
jury sitting at the inquest into the
death of Mrs. Alice Tristram Shanks,
formerly a well-known singer, exoner-
ated Thomas Totten, who had been
accused of placing carbolic acid be-
fore the woman to drink when she
joined a party including Totten and
his companions at the Golf House
restaurant in Corlandt Park last
week. The jury held that Totten
placed the poison before the woman
without knowledge that it was poison
and without any criminal intent. The
coroner, however, did not approve of
the verdict, and held Totten for the
grand jury. Totten's four companions
were discharged from custody.

RUSHING COAL ACROSS.
North Portland, Dec. 7.—As a
result of the duty of 53 cents a ton on
United States soft coal, which was
taken off in August, being reimposed on
Tuesday night at 12 o'clock, there was
a great rush yesterday to get all cars
possible over the boundary. During
the past 20 hours over 300 cars of coal
from the St. Paul gateway entered
Canada at this point, 200 cars being
consigned to the C. P. R., and the bal-
ance being domestic coal for Moosejaw,
Weyburn, Swift Current, and points
through Western Canada.
