Crisis Is Near. Washington, Aug. 26.-Unless President Wilson has received from Huerta today the acceptance of his mediation proposals he will announce in an address to Congress the failure of the Lind mission to the Mexican Re-

public. Almost simultaneously with this announcement the President will promulgate a new policy towards Mexico. He will suggest the retirement of all Americans from Mexico and will throw up a more formidable barrier against the shipment of arms and ammunition into that country. All the resources of the Government will be used to assist those Americans who desire to retire from the southern republic. Having thus offered safety to Americans and having closed the door for future shipments of munitions of war, the President will follow a policy of noninterference, leaving the Mexicans to struggle between themselves and work

out their own salvation.

With the announcement of this new policy, however, will come a sharp demand upon the Huerta Government and all the revolutionary leaders in Mexico to safeguard American life and property. President Wilson will let Huerta and his enemies know in very positive terms that they will be held esponsible for any acts committed against Americans or their properties. As a means of el forcing the neutrality laws more stangently it is likethat new troops vill be ordered to the border and vessele that are needed to convey Americans from Mexican territory will be sent by the United
