EIGHTY WOMEN BURNED BY ENRAGED VILLAGERS

Importation of Cheap Girl Labor Aroused People to Fury, and They Fired Big Barn Where the Women Were Sleeping.

St. Petersburg, June 19.—Eighty women were burned to death today by villagers enraged at the importation of cheap girl labor to work on a sugar estate in the district of Piriatin, in the province of Poltava, Southern Russia, according to the Kiex newspaper Kiev Liamin.

The excited villagers first securely fastened all the means of exit from a wooden barn, in which the girls were housed. They then set fire to the building while the inmates were still asleep, and all were burned to death without a chance of escape.
