INDIAN SEALERS CLAIM \$1,500,000 FROM GOVT

Mr. Justice Audette Will Deal With Question On His Return.

Victoria, B. C., Oct. 31.—When Mr. Justice Audette returns to Victoria from the east at the first of next month to resume the hearings of the sealing claims he will be confronted with one of the most gigantic tasks that any judge of the Dominion bench has had to deal with.

Nearly seven hundred Indian hunters have called on Captain George Kirkendall, shipping master, for their time certificates, and are now having their claims for compensation from the Dominion Government made out. The Indians have come from the Queen Charlotte Islands and all the reservations on the coast of Vancouver Island to have their claims made out. It may be somewhat surprising to learn that there were seven hundred natives interested in the sealing business as hunters. Some of the men were out every year from the early days of the industry according to a report, up to 1911, when they were forced out by the pelagic sealing treaty. Judging from the claims of the Indians, the Dominion Government will have a heavy bill of compensation to pay. The total amount which the natives are looking for will run well up to \$1,500,000.

Very few of the Indians speak the English language and the examination will necessitate the presence of an interpreter.

After the Indians are finished there are the claims of several hundred captains, mates, e-seamen, boat pullers, boat steersmen and hunters to be heard, so that two months will probably be required.

MRS. GEORGE PATTULLO BURIED AT WOODSTOCK

Wife of Registrar of Oxford Was Only Ill For Ten Days.

Woodstock, Nov. 1. — The funeral took place today from the family residence, Burnside, to the Presbyterian Cemetery, of Mrs. George R. Pattullo, wife of George R. Pattullo, registrar of Oxford. She had been ill only about ten days and her death was hastened by the shock of the demise of her sister, Mrs. Casey.

Deceased was a descendant of two well-known families. She was a daughter of the late James Lyons Biggar, of Carrying Place, for many years member of the House of Commons for East Northumberland. Her mother was Isabella Hodgins, sister of the late John G. Hodgins, deputy minister of education for Ontario, and of the late Thos. Hodgins, K. C., judge of the marine court in Toronto. Deceased married Mr. Pattullo in January, 1889. She was deeply and actively interested in hospital work and the local Grenfell Mission. All her brothers and sisters on this side of the Atlantic were in attendance during the past few days, including W. H. Biggar, G. T. B. Biggar, of Montreal; Lieut.-Col. J. L. Biggar, Ottawa; George C. Biggar, Toronto; Mrs. George F. Burton, Toronto, and Mrs. R. A. Bull, Belleville.

Charged With Firing His \$15,000 Yacht

New York, Oct. 31. — Captain John Albert Fish, a member of the New York Yacht Club and formerly a civil engineer with the British army during the Boer war, was arraigned in the federal court today charged with having burned the yacht Senata in Edgartown harbor, Massachusetts, three years ago for the purpose of collecting \$15,000 insurance. The maximum punishment therefor is life imprisonment. Fish was indicted after losing his suit against the United States Lloyd's to recover the insurance. He was held in \$15,000 bail.
