SIR WILLIAM WHYTE, FORMER LONDONER, DIED IN CALIFORNIA TUESDAY

One of Canada's Best-Known Railwaymen and Financiers.

STATION AGENT HERE FOR SEVEN YEARS

Began Work As a Brakeman and Mastered His Business From Ground Up.

Sir William Whyte, vice-president of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, one of the pioneers of the road and a former London railwayman for several years, died yesterday at Cor-onado Beach, California, after an illness of several weeks' duration. He

vas 71 years of age.
Sir William was known as one of the most capable railwaymen in Canada and his knowledge of traffichandling on the iron roads was obtained by actual practice and through long association with the work.

While devoting the greater part of his time to railway enterprise, he took a keen interest in military affairs. At the time of the Fenian raid he was captain of a Grand Trunk rifle corps, and he continued in the service until

it was disbanded. While at his home, 603 River avenue. Winnipeg, early in March, he was taken ill and his physicians decided that a trip south to a warmer climate was necessary. Accordingly, with his wife and daughter, he removed to Coronado Beach. While there he was obliged to undergo an operation for gall stones, and the length of his stay was thereby greatly extended. 
