Ham and Eggs.

Many have bacon and eggs as a standard dish for breakfast, with great frequency. For warm weather there is no objection to ham and eggs, and for a handy labor and heat saver we find cold boiled ham one of the greatest conveniences as a summer meat. We will, because of this fact, buy enough ham, knuckle (at proper price) preferred, to have some boiled ham and other convenient dinner and lunch dishes. We will have the slices cut from the knuckle by the market man and the rest can be kept in a tight paper bag until we decide to boil it, say about next Tuesday for dinner.

Orange Filling. Put one-quarter cup of butter and one cup of granulated sugar in a saucepan and melt. Stir and add the yolks of three eggs, beaten together well, and the stiffly beaten white of one egg, the Juice of two oranges and the grated yellow rind of one. Stir constantly and cook about six minutes. The mixture should be quite thick. Cool and spread between layers of cake. The two remaining whites may be used for an icing to be flavored with orange.

Good Blueberry Pudding. Mix and sift two cupfuls of pastry flour, four teaspoonfuls of baking powder, and one-half teaspoonful of salt. Work in two tablespoonfuls of butter, using the tips of the fingers, and add one cupful of milk, gradually; then add one cupful of blueberries rolled in one tablespoonful of flour. Turn into a buttered mold, not having mold more than two-thirds full, and adjust buttered cover. Place mold on a trivet in kettle containing boiling water, allowing water to come half way up around mold. All sorts of canned vegetables are better heated in the can, then serving with a good sauce poured over con-

> Biarritz People Overwhelm Germans With Kindness On Arrival. [Canadian Press.]

Paris, Sept. 1 .- A Havas dispatch from Biarritz says that the arrival of a convov of 133 wounded soldiers and twelve officers today gave rise to a general manifestation of sympathy on the part of the foreign colony, in which the British and Spanish took a conspicuous part. They loaded the soldiers with flowers, cigarettes, cigars and other presents all kinds. Automobiles were placed at their disposal and refreshments were served in the salons of the Casino, where hospital wards, with all possible comforts, were arranged. 


