[Special Cable to The Advertiser.] GRAND HEADQUARTERS OF FRENCH ARMIES, SEPT. 30 .- In first fifteen weeks of the Somme offensive the French and British have captured more ground than has been taken by Germany in more than six months of battling at Verdun,

Hold 92 Square Miles. A survey of results of the great drive, halted temperorarily yesterday by a terrific downpour of rain, shows that the Allies have reconquered 285 square kilometres of French territory (about 92 square miles), exceeding by fifteen kilometres the territory gained by the

Forty-five villages, each one organized into a veritable fortress by the Teutons, have fallen before the battering of the French and British artillery. In every instance the German position was so strong that it had to be broken down by shell fire before the infantry could storm it. A total of 62,000 prisoners, 285 cannons, half of which are heavy pieces, and more than 1,000 machine guns have been taken.

Back to Third Line, Everywhere from Ancre to a point near Chaulnes, the German first, second and third lines are completely in the hands of the Allies, who this week were rushing through hastily-constructed German trenches for great gains when bad veather halted the operations.


