The Deadliest Diseases.

A most interesting document is the report issued annually by Sir George Newman, the chief medical officer of the British government. question is answered by a table showing that if they offered it for each one hanged. of every 1,000 deaths:

174 were caused by bronchitis, pneumonia and other respiratory diseases.

168 by diseases of the heart and circulation.

106 by cancer and malignant disease. 100 by diseases of the nervous system.

87 by all forms of tuberculosis.

Sir George Newman does not dwell upon successes achieved but upon tasks awaiting performance. Of every 1,000 babies born about 70 fail to survive their first year. This is a good standard compared with a generation ago, but Sir George says there is still room for considerable improvement, particularly as regards the mortality in the first four weeks of life.

Influenza is baffling the medical profession. There were 18,896 deaths from influenza in England and Wales during last year. The disease appears to attack adolescent youth more than other people. "No material advance," says Sir George, "has been made in our knowledge of the bacteriology of influenza." The various claims to discoveries of the influenza germ are not credited.

Sleeping sickness claims an increasing number of victims. For practical purposes it is regarded as a new disease of the last six years. "An attack of hiccup may precede or accompany the nervous symptoms and there is some reason for regarding hiccup as a mild form of sleeping sickness."
