The prize drawing took place for the Crystal Show immediately after the concert and when all was over the large crowd wended their way home thoroughly tired but happy.

The crowd in the afternoon was estimated at between 8,000 and 9,000 people and was the largest since the memorable meet of 1895.

The celebration is being continued to-day and by to-morrow the greatest celebration in the history of Waterloo will pass into history.

The drill by the little city was the prettiest sight of the afternoon and they were heartily applauded on their return.

Kreutzigers Box Factory Burned to the Ground

The large box factory belonging to Mr. Chas. Kreutziger on Erb street was burned to the ground yesterday morning entailing a loss of between \$35,000 and \$45,000. The fire was first noticed about 12:35 a. m. and box 25 was pulled. The firemen responded quickly and soon had seven streams playing on the building but owing to the large amount of lumber in the building the fire licked up everything in sight and the heroic efforts of the firemen were of no avail and the building was completely gutted. It is to be regretted that this factory should fall a prey to the flames as they were very busy working over time.

The factory employees were busy Thursday night until ten o'clock and when they left everything was in good order and the origin of the fire is a mystery.

The water pressure was excellent, the gauge at the pumping plant registering 83 lbs.

The building and machinery were valued at \$32,000 and there was from \$5,000 to \$8,000 of stock on hand.

There was \$13,500 insurance and the loss to Mr. Kreutziger will be very heavy.

Mr. Kreutziger has not definitely decided as to whether he will rebuild or not. He had established a good business and it is to be hoped he will see his way clear to build in the near future.
