CROW'S NEST RAILWAY

Terms Upon Which the Canadian Pacific Railway Will Get the Subsidy.

Mr. McMullen Wants to Make the Civil Service Independent of Politics.

OTTAWA, April 9.—(Special)—Colonel Burland and Major McLean, of Montreal; Colonel Mason and Major Elliott, of Toronto, were here to-day and saw Hon. Mr. Cartwright, acting minister of militia, regarding the sending of the provisional jangle regiment to England in June.

OTTAWA, April 9.—(Special)—The admirals of the foreign fleets and consuls held a meeting this morning at the Admiralty, discussing whether the consuls should renew parleying with the insurgent leaders. It was decided not to do so.

CANADA'S PAST LINE. LONDON, April 9.—In the House of Commons to-day the secretary of state for the colonies, Mr. Joseph Chamberlain, answering a question on the subject announced that a contract had been signed between Canada and the Pattersons of Newcastle, for a fast steamship service between Canada and Great Britain.

OTTAWA, April 9.—The Minister of Railways and Canals was to-day interviewed by the forwarding interests regarding the canal, and that the staffs be not reduced. It is said that the arrangement with the C.P.R. in connection with the Crow's Nest are almost complete, and it is likely that the subsidy will be \$4,000 a mile and the company will likely make concessions regarding rates.

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OTTAWA, April 9.—(Special)—The conference between Mr. De Val and the archbishop of St. Boniface as left Montreal, travelling on the same train as conveyed the Governor-General back to Ottawa.

OTTAWA, April 9.—At the meeting of the Licensed Victuallers' Association to-day a letter was read from Miram Walker & Sons, the Walkerville distillers, declining to become members of the society. The letter caused great indignation among the members, who are expected to receive hearty assistance from the Walkers in securing government liquor inspectors. A resolution is proposed by the society to adopt retaliatory measures against the Walkers.

OTTAWA, April 9.—(Special)—The political campaign in this city and district was opened by the Ministerialists last night by a meeting held in the St. Louis hotel, the new headquarters of the Ministerialists. Addresses were delivered by Messrs. Flynn, Pelletier, Chapais and others.

OTTAWA, April 9.—(Special)—The Independents of Winnipeg will meet on Saturday to name a temperance labor candidate against Jamieson, the Liberal candidate for Winnipeg.

OTTAWA, April 9.—(Special)—A protest will be entered against Marceote's return for Champlain on the ground of clerical intimidation and corruption.

OTTAWA, April 9.—A Sackett's Harbor, N.Y., who year ago was married by telegraph in Oklahoma, he and the bride at one end and a magistrate at the other, has written to the Kingston legal firm for an opinion as to the legality of the ceremony. His wife deserted him three years ago, and he has fallen in love with another woman, and would like to marry her, if it could be shown that the act would not be bigamous.

OTTAWA, April 9.—(Special)—The latest news from England regarding the making of the improvement daily, and will leave for home on April 21.

OTTAWA, April 9.—(Special)—The Dennis Conservatives will choose a candidate for the legislature on April 27. Hugh Macdonald will likely be elected.

OTTAWA, April 9.—(Special)—Dr. Smith, superintendent of the Dominion Lazaretto at Tracadie, N. B., has decided to remove the three leprosy cases in this city to Tracadie, and will leave with them to-morrow. They travel in a separate car.

OTTAWA, April 9.—(Special)—A serious fire occurred in the wholesale district to-night, doing damage estimated at \$50,000. The buildings damaged were owned by Wm. McKinnon, president Toronto street railway, and the chief occupants and losers were: F. W. Ellis, jeweler, \$9,000; Fibre Champlain Co., \$15,000; Textile Buckskin Co., \$3,000; Alfred Clayton, machinery supplies, \$2,500; J. M. Davidson, barber supplies, \$2,000; C. E. Graham, East India Tea Co., \$3,000; E. Hillbrook, Toronto Whip Co., \$2,500.

OTTAWA, April 9.—(Special)—J. C. Secretary, Ottawa, surveyor and engineer, arrived from the East this afternoon, en route the Yukon territory, at the head of an exploring party. Eight young men, members of the expedition, reached the city yesterday and proceeded west to wait the arrival of their chief at Vancouver. It is understood the party are going north, in the interest of an Ottawa syndicate, to explore for gold.

MOBE OF CRETE.

LONDON, April 8.—Answering a question relative to the date of the evacuation of the island of Crete by the Turkish troops, the Parliamentary secretary for the Foreign Office, said in the Commons to-day that France had asked the powers for their views on the early evacuation of the island by the Turks, but, he added, it was impossible to announce the exact date of the withdrawal of the Turkish forces. Several of the powers, he continued, were of the opinion that the Greek forces must first be withdrawn.

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AT LAST IT IS WAR.

Greek Irregulars Have Crossed the Frontier and Are Fighting the Turks.

The Sultan's Army Preparing for a General Advance Against the Aggressors.

ELASSONA, Macedonia, April 9.—A dispatch received at the Turkish headquarters here from Creva says that the fighting between the Greeks and the Turks continues. The Turks, following the instructions of Edin Pasha, have surrounded the Greek irregulars and a greater part of the Turkish division stationed at Creva, under Haki Pasha, is now advancing. It is impossible to distinguish whether the invaders are supported by any substantial portion of the Greek regular army as the Greeks have taken up a position in the middle of a forest. But, the correspondent of the Associated Press is informed, the moment the Turkish officers ascertain the presence of the irregulars of Greek regulars in the ranks of the aggressors, Edin Pasha will order the advance of the whole Turkish army.

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WAR IS DECLARED.

That Is the Report at Midnight on the Greek-Turkish Troubles.

Irregular Troops Composed of Volunteers Have Apparently Precipitated a General Campaign.

LONDON, April 10.—A dispatch to the Observer from Rome says it was reported at midnight that war had been declared between Turkey and Greece. The Athens correspondent to the Times telegraphed: "The hand of invaders organized under the personal direction of Gonzo, a Greek of Alexandria. The headquarters were in the valley of the mountains, the famous monasteries of Memora. Most of the members of the band, which includes a number of Italian volunteers, arrived last week by special train from Yolo. A camp was chosen and military organization was proceeded with. Two former Greek officers, Mylonas and Kapsalotonicos were given the supreme command."
