GRAND LODGE I. O. O. F. MEETING AT YARMOUTH

Visiting Delegates Were Most Hospitably Entertained

When the fiftieth annual session of the Grand Lodge of Odd Fellows of the Maritime Provinces of Canada closed on Thursday night, the universal opinion of the delegates was that Yarmouth was the ideal town for conventions. The hospitality of the people was unbounded. The industries, such as the cotton mills and the iron works, were opened for inspection, and everywhere the delegates of the three bodies of the order were welcomed. Killam Hall, where the Grand Lodge met, was turned into a fairy land, with blooms, banners, pictures, mottoes, and British and American flags. The decorations were so beautiful that Past Grand Sir Pinkerton spoke of them in praise. The decorator was Mr. Chapman, formerly a resident of St. John, while Past Grand Master Craig was the overseer.

While the new legislation passed was not extensive, the sessions of the bodies were busy ones. In dealing with the financial and other schemes of the order, Grand Master Craig made a good presiding officer and handled the business with promptness, so that the different committees were not subject to any delay in getting their reports before Grand Lodge. The only incident that marred the buoyant spirit of Grand Lodge was the illness of Grand Secretary J. J. McKinnon, who is now reported to be improving and in a week or so will be able to return to his home in Charlottetown.

Among the pleasant features of the meetings was the visit of Dr. Marshall, Grand Master of the State of Massachusetts, Hon. A. S. Pinkerton, Past Grand Sir, and the Grand Treasurer and Grand Marshal of the State of Massachusetts. They were received with honors. Their addresses were all of a high order, and before they retired Grand Lodge sang, blest be the Tie that Binds.

After the installation of the elective officers, Grand Master Stewart appointed, the officers: Howard Flieger, Charham, N. B., Grand Marshal; Charles Maynard, Windsor, N. S., Grand Conductor; E. O. Leadbetter, Port Hood, N. S., Grand Guardian, and Jesse Green, Plaster Rock, N. B., Grand Herald.

The Rebekah Assembly had quite a long session, and adopted a new constitution and by-laws. On Thursday night the Rebekahs of Yarmouth gave a reception to the visiting Rebekahs, and Odd Fellows. There was good music, good readings and good addresses and refreshments. A feature of the evening was the presentation to George A. Kent, of Truro, with a gold mounted ebony walking stick, and a pair of gold sleeve links. The presentation by Mrs. Mary Matheson, Past President of the Assembly, as a memento of Brother Kent's 70th birthday and the interest he took in the Rebekah branch of the order. Mr. Kent thanked his donors and said as long as he was spared would do all he could in the interest of the Rebekahs.

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CURE FOR THE FOOT AND MOUTH DISEASE

London, Aug. 22.—A Paris despatch says that a veterinary specialist from Pas De Calais has arrived at Charoll with a remedy for the foot and mouth disease. Eighteen infected cattle at Martigny Lecomte have almost recovered after two days of treatment. Official trials of the remedy will be made.

The success of the experiments already carried out is hailed with delight, as cattle raisers of France and England have lost heavily through the pestilence.

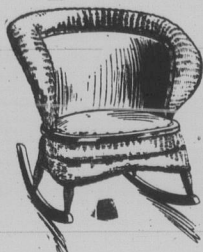

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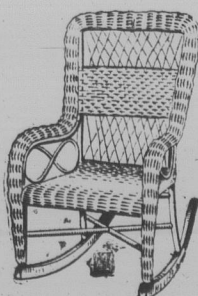
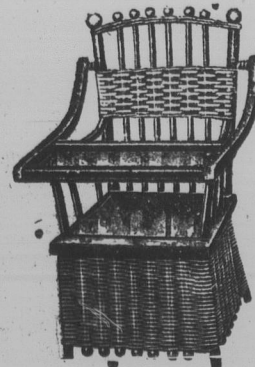
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
