ALARMED INHABITANTS LEAVING THE CITY OF SHANGHAI. Official Report of the London Assurance Co. of Canton to an Agent. SHANGHAI, Aug. 29.—European residents in Shanghai remain unalarmed. Many Chinese have become alarmed and are leaving. The chief magistrate and consuls have issued placards urging the natives to remain in their homes as the French have no present intention of attacking Shanghai or Wou Sang. The Chinese authorities here have received an important telegram from Peking, the purport of which is not precisely known. Reports are received, however, that China is desirous of coming to an agreement with France. The victory of Canton has ordered all Frenchmen to leave his province immediately.
