Toronto, Jan. 17.—At the city cattle market trade was good for all kinds of butcher cattle to-day. There was practically no export demand on the market and the best butchers sold as high as \$5.20 and \$5.25 per 100 pounds. An extra choice fat bull, weighing over 2,000 lbs., was sold at \$5.75, and there was a strong demand for all fat bulls and cows. Prices were quiet and as high as \$5.50 for the choice ones. Common and medium grades of cattle were stealer. The run was quite heavy, and it is anticipated that if the large supply keeps up, prices will soon have to waver a little. Hogs were slightly firmer, being quoted as high as \$7.50 per cwt., fed and watered. Lambs were slow and slightly lower than Monday. The best price recorded was \$5.35. This was largely accounted for by the large quantity of stock left over from Monday's market. At the junction trade in milk cows was slow and not quite so firm as for the past while. Calves were good and firm at Monday's quotations. The run was composed of 80 loads, comprising 1,500 cattle, 300 hogs, 190 calves and 655 sheep and lambs.
