Mr. Pelletier, the Postmaster-Jeneral, is aggravated. He announces in a letter sent out to publishers that because the Senate refused to pass his bill giving him the power to increase the rate of postage on newspapers up to one cent and a half a is probably no business in Canada in which there is keener competition than in the publication of periodicals.
