

An Appeal to the Farmers of Lambton

 $\mathbf{T}^{\mathrm{HERE}}$ is no desire on the part of Lambtons 149 to strip the farms of all able-bodied men, or to cause such a shortage of labor that abundant crops cannot be produced. The fact remains, however, that while some farmers are sacrificing a great deal for King and Country, there are others who have two, three and even four sons at home, one of whom should enter military service. Attention is also directed to the following means whereby it is hoped to prevent too great a shortage of farm laborers:

I. The Government is importing men from the United States, and farmers

wishing to secure laborers can do so by applying for them.

II. Men who enlist are allowed to work on the farms for one month in the spring and one month during harvest, for which they will be paid by the farmer.

III. High School Students studying for Entrance to the Model School, Normal School and Faculties of Education and Public School Students going up for Entrance to High School are allowed to leave school this spring and if they produce a statement showing that they have worked three months for a farmer, will

on the recommendation of the school authorities receive their certificates.

Under these circumstances an earnest appeal is made to farmers who have eligible men on their farms to release them for service. There is no question that it means a sacrifice- but it is a necessary sacrifice-one which must be made if our Empire is to be saved.

In Europe women and children are doing the farm work-and doing it well. Canada must make a similar sacrifice for it is our war-and we must win it.

Every man who can get away should enlist---and those who remain behind are asked if they cannot go themselves, to do all they can to make it possible for others to go and to do everything they can to
