O. T. A. IN LAMBTON Enforcing the Ontario temperance act in Lambton west during the year ending April 30, 1922 cost \$3,203.-97, according to a schedule incorporated in the report of the Ontario board of license commissioners for the year 1922. The expenses in East Lambton amounted to \$1,511.90. Another schedule reveals that there were 29 convictions against non-licensees in West Lambton during the same period and 9 dismissals. In the eastern half of the county 18 were convicted with no dismissals. There were no convictions against holders of standard hotel licenses in either portion of the county. All these prosecutions were by provincial officers. The amounts collected and payable to the province for fines imposed in Lambton west was \$4,615.00 and in Lambton east \$1,765.00.

BRITAIN WILL PAY U. S. FOR ARMY

An agreement has been signed be-tween the Governments of the United States, France, Italy, Bel-gium and Great Britain regarding the reimbursement of the cost of the American army of occupation.

The amount due to the United States is to be payable in twelve yearly instalments in cash. The receipts of the British Government under the Reparations Recovery Act are not available for this purpose. The first payment is due on December 31st next. These instalments will not take precedence of the sums due Great Britain for the British army of occupation before December 1 1926, but will after that date.

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
