A former Bay of Fundy freighter, the steamer Granville, which performs a weekly service between Annapolis Royal and St. John before the present Granville II was built, has been sold through David W. Simpson, Boston, to parties in Cuba. She has been laid up at Gloucester for some time, previous to which she took a party of timber land explorers to Labrador. The term scht. J. Scott Hankinson, Capt. Arthur Moore, which went from Yarmouth to Weymouth, several weeks ago, to complete her cargo for Bermuda, has commenced taking on lumber. Mr. Hankinson, owner of the vessel, is also loading the United States vessel Lincoln for New York. Before they can get out of the river, a channel must be cut through the ice, for the vessels to pass out to sea. Less than three days, from New York and about two days from Vineyard Haven, the schooner Canada, Capt. H. R. Richard, arrived in Halifax Thursday morning with a cargo of 207 tons of hard coal and docked at Whitman's wharf. After being storm-bound at City Island for over ten days the Canada got away at 10 a.m. on Thursday and left Vineyard Haven at 8:30 a.m. the next day. She arrived off Chubchoct Head at four o'clock Thursday morning and had to beat her way up the harbor. Annapolis Spectator: In his recent trip around the world in command of the 5000 ton steamship Eastern Planet, of the United States and Australia, S. S. Co. out of New York, Capt. W. Willett, now home again at Round Hill, touched at twelve ports including the Panama Canal, at all levels—Colon, Chalmers, Hobart, Umaned, Port Chalmers, Hobart, Melbourne, Port Pirie, Adelaide, Durban, Las Palmas, Rotterdam and back to New York. His longest run between ports was from Adelaide to Durban, South Africa, which he made in twenty-eight days. He came the southern passage from Rotterdam to New York in fifteen days and had fine weather all the way, total one hundred and seventy-seven days. Two steamers which are to call at Halifax and complete loading for the United Kingdom ports are the Isadora and Koenigsmark, both under charter to I. H. Mothers and Son, Tribes, three days out from Birmingham, G. B., and reporting an extremely rough voyage with the elements using the ship as if she was a bit of cork. The Isadora arrived at Digby Wednesday night to take aboard about three thousand tons of pulp, going to Halifax to finish. The Koenigsmark left Newcastle-on-Tyne on Saturday for St. John and after discharging a cargo of coal there will proceed to Digby to load part cargo of pulp and completing at Halifax. The Digby portion of the two cargoes comes from the Weymouth mills and what is loaded at Halifax is from the Port Clyde mills.

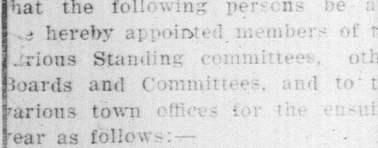

Newly Elected Councillors and Mayor Duly Subscribed and Sworn In

A special meeting of the Town Council of the town of Bridgetown was called by the Mayor and he pursuant to written notice given to the Clerk in writing to each member of the Council twenty-four hours previous to such meeting, with Mayor A.
