HARTLAND, N. B.—The new residence of G. R. Burt will cost \$5,000.

STRATHCLAIR, MAN.—S. Russell intends building a dwelling house.

WESTON, ONT.—Extensive improvements will be made to the high school.

CHISELHURST, ONT.—The foundation for a Presbyterian church is being built.

GALT, ONT.—A sewer will be built from the hospital to the river, cost \$800.

BRANTFORD, ONT.—The Massey-Harris Co. contemplate building a large addition to their factory.

NIAGARA FALLS, ONT.—W. Cole is open to receive tenders up to 17th inst. for supplying a rock crusher.

THOROLD, ONT.—The ratepayers will be asked to sanction a loan of \$7,000 to extend the electric light plant.
