## HUMAN RIGHTS

A total of 57 instruments are listed in the UN Document "Human Fights: a Compilation of International Instruments" produced in 1983. With the adoption of the Convention against Torture and Other Cruel, Inhuman or Degrading Treatment or Punishment in December 1984, the Declaration on the human rights of individuals who are not nationals of the country in which they live and the Convention against Apartheid in Sports, both in December 1985, and the Declaration on the Right to Development in December 1986, there are now 62 instruments. Of these 62, 32 are treaties (this term includes covenants, conventions/and protocols). The remainder are declarations, codes and standard minimum rules.

Canada is party to 21 of these 32 treaties. More importantly, we are party to five of the six major human rights instruments, i.e. the International Covenant on Economic, Social and Cultural Rights (ICESCR), the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Racial Discrimination (CERD), the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights (ICCPR), the Optional Protocol to the ICCPR and the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination Against Women (CEDAW). The one major human rights convention to which Canada is not a party is the International Convention on the Suppression and Punishment of the Crime of Apartheid.

On June 24, 1987 Canada ratified the Convention Against Torture and Other Cruel, Inhuman or Degrading Treatment or Punishment, following extensive discussions with the provinces and territories and amendments to the Criminal Code to allow full implementation of the Convention.

## CANADIAN REPORTS UNDER UN HUMAN RIGHTS CONVENTIONS

Canada's ninth report under the CERD was submitted to the Committee on August 12, 1988 and will be considered within the next year. The second report under the CEDAW was submitted to the Committee in February, 1988 and it is expected that the Canadian report will be considered by the Committee in early 1989. The second report under the ICCPR is being finalized and will be submitted to the Human Rights Committee in the near
