EASTERN RAILWAY SUPPLY COMPANY.

Mr. BARKER asked:

1. What, if any, contracts or dealings has the Eastern Railway Supply Company, as principal or otherwise, had with the government since the first day of July, 1902, for sale or supply to the government railways, of belting, water hose, hardware, varnish, fencing wire, or other rail-way supplies; and has said company, as com-mission agent or otherwise, supplied any such stores or supplies to such railways since said date ?

2. What were the dates and values of such contracts, dealings or arrangements, if any, and

or what periods were they made?

3. What sums, if any, have been paid to said company or their principals by the government for the several years from the date aforesaid till the 31st December, 1905?

4. Is said company incorporated? If so, how

and where?

5. If not incorporated, what are the names, residence and occupations of the persons forming the company?

6. Where is the principal office of said com-

pany?

7. What are the names, residence and occupation of its president and secretary, respectively?

Hon. H. R. EMMERSON (Minister of Railways and Canals):

As to questions 1, 2 and 3, the informa-, tion is too voluminous to answer in the form of an inquiry, and as the hon. gentleman has moved for an Order covering it, there will be no unnecessary delay in bringing the papers down.

4. The department is informed; but not officially, that the company is incorporated under the laws of the Colony of Newfound-

land.

5. No. 4 answers this.6. Halifax, Nova Scotia, so far as the de-

partment can ascertain.

7. The name of the president is to the department unknown, but reference to tenders shows that F. Fred. Pearson, of Halifax, signs on behalf of company as secretary.

HOG PLAGUE.

Mr. CLEMENTS asked:

1. What townships in West Kent and East Kent are under quarantine in respect to the

hog plague ?

2. How long has each of said townships been so quarantined, and how many cases of said disease have been reported in each of said townships during the past year, and what is the name of the township and place in each instance ?

3. What government officials or veterinary surgeons are employed in each of said townships at the present time, and what is the salary and detailed expense of each of said officials or veterinary surgeons employed in

respect of the said plague?

4. What amount has been paid by the government for the past year in respect of said quarantine?

Hon. SYDNEY FISHER (Minister of Agriculture):

1. Tilbury East, Raleigh, East Dover, West Dover, Chatham, Harwich, Camden, Howard.

2. Tilbury East, Raleigh, East Dover, West Dover, Chatham and Harwich were quarantined on October 22, 1902, Camden and Howard being added on May 1, 1905.

Camden was originally quarantined with the other townships on October 22, 1902, but had been released on November 25 of the same year.

3. There are no government officers or veterinary surgeons employed in any of the said townships solely. There are four in-pectors employed for a larger area, in which said townships are included, who inspect carloads of hogs going out for immediate slaughter.
