## RAILWAY RATES.

Mr. SINCLAIR (Antigonish and Guysborough):

How much were railway rates advanced since 1915 on the roads: (a) east of Port Arthur; (b) west of Port Arthur?

Hon. Mr. RE1D: (a) By its General Order No. 167, dated July 3, 1916, the board permitted a more or less general increase in freight rates in Eastern Canada. This increase affected the so-called special freight tariffs referred to in section 328 of the Railway Act, 1907; that is to say, the special (not the standard maximum) tariffs applicable to freight carried under the Canadian Freight Classification, and the so-called commodity rates. The increases granted varied according to districts and nature of commodities, but the general effect was an approximate increase of 5 per cent on the traffic as a whole. (b) By its General Order No. 212, dated January 15, 1918, which, after postponement, was confirmed by Order in Council P.C. 1862, dated March 14, 1918, a general increase in freight rates in both Eastern and Western Canada was approved, and was expected to approximate 15 per cent. At the same time approval was given to an increase in the standard maximum passenger fare east of the Rock Mountains from 3 cents to 3.45 a mile.

Because of the statutory limitations the freight rate increase in the West averaged 10 per cent, while in the East it averaged 15 per cent.

By Order in Council P.C. 1863, dated July 27, 1918, freight rates throughout Canada were mandatorily increased in variable amounts approximating in general 25 per cent, but working out in practice an average of about 20 per cent.

6. What proportion of all working expenses is the said St. John and Quebec Railway Company to pay the said Canadian Pacific Railway in the above agreement?

7. What will this payment of interest by the said St. John and Quebec Railway Company amount to yearly, and what will their proportion of all working expenses covered by the said agreement amount to yearly?

said agreement amount to yearly? 8. What do the gross earnings of the St. John and Quebec railway amount to monthly and yearly?

Sir GEORGE FOSTER: This does not seem to be a question with which the Dominion Government has anything to do, and we have no records in connection with the matter.

## THE PROPRIETARY OR PATENT MEDICINE ACT.
