d—d deal too lazy to do any good for themselves; it was the Irish that he liked to see, because they worked hard, and were easy of management.

Cattermole also says in his publication, that "it must be a satisfaction to persons inclined to emigrate, to hear it admitted on all sides, that the mechanic, small farmer, and day labourer, no sooner land, than they are eagerly sought after and employed." This is another most about hable and gratuitous assertion; for if such were the see, I ask, how comes it that so many are constantly returning to this country? Is it to be supposed that if they could meet with employment in America at all, that they would, in so short a time, be again in their fatherland? The thing is absurd.

I am sorry in having to allude to instances of unworthy conduct in British captains towards the emigrants, who many times get short of provisions, and who are charged an enormous price for any thing they may require. This I have witnessed; and I have been informed that masters of vessels have very often protracted the voyage, solely for the purpose of making an excellent market of the poor creatures, by selling to them the necessaries of life at most entortional: prices.
