

This has helped to secure it such a beauty place. It is, with the exception of Sir H. A. Allan's residence in Montreal, the most superb residence in the Dominion. The view from the mansion is of the utmost grandeur, embracing a bird's eye view of the city and its environs with a glimpse of Niagara Falls in the distance. The residence externally is also fitted up with magnificent beauty. On view is the stabling which again has the same lavish spending and taste which characterizes the entire establishment. See plate 26.

Sited on Sherbourne street, between Carleton and Wellesley streets, is the residence of H. S. Howland, Esq. It is of massive proportions. The grounds are particularly well laid out. Very spacious, the residence is surrounded by a variety of trees and shrubs, some of them being of great size and beauty that must be perfectly beyond words in beauty.

Oaklands.—The residence of John Macdonald, Esq., M.P., situated in the village of the upper part of the village of Oaklands, is one of the prettiest. The visitor to pass over this domain is at once struck with its beauty, which conveys the idea that one is in some pleasure grounds as much as a stately home. But the family residing there. Sited on the corner of Laclede's Creek street, is the residence of George Laidlow, Esq. The building is in the Gothic style of architecture and is magnificently situated. The house is surrounded by a fully and elegantly, with a variety of flowers, trees, and shrubs, making a picture of perfection. Adjoining the house is a large conservatory full of the choicest evergreen; there is a large walled compartment on the pleasure ground. See plate 21.

Crescent Place.—The residence of Mrs. D. Moore is situated on the corner of Welton Green and South Park street; it is of Gothic architecture and substantially built, and although of plain exterior appearance, has the look of being erected for comfort instead of show. It is placed on one of the finest corners in the city, and surrounded with its lawn and
