ourfelves; of "approaching Him withour lips, while our hearts are far from Him." No fecrets can be hid from His all-fearching eye. And though he rejecteth not the fighing of a contrite heart; neither desireth the death of a finner, though He is ready to aid, by His good spirit, the struggies of returning virtue, and to receive; like a tender father, with favour and indulgence, His repentant; though prodigal fon : He cannot view, without indignation, the prefumptuous boldnefs of those weak mortals, who fubfitute a flew of devotion in the room of fincere virtue, of good and holy refolutions, who bow down before Him as it were in mockery, and approach Him " with a lie in their right hand."

THE folly of fuch an attempt can be furpafied only by its danger. Senfible of guilt, and of frailty, we fhould feek, in all humblenefs of mind, fome meansof explating our pail offences, fome propto-
