## ALL IS IN READINESS FOR Y.M.C.A. GATHERING

First Sessions to Be Held To-day in Massey Hall—Some of the Topics.

The 37th international convention of Young Men's Christian Associations of North America will open to-day in Massey Hall, with from 1500 to 2000 delegates. Between 5 and 8 p.m. Lt. Gen. Gibson, Premier Whitney and Mayor Geary, will welcome the delegates at the city hall.

At all the sessions of the convention the galleries will be open to the public, but voting delegates, as distinguished from corresponding delegates, only will be admitted to the ground floor during the business sessions. Among the questions to be dealt with at the convention three are formally set forth:

First, the resolutions presented by the Pacific coast presidents and general secretaries, providing that any 19 per cent. of the associations shall have the right to file a referendum petition at any time within 90 days after an international convention. The argument

for this is that at the convention many of the associations are unable to have proper representation and, therefore, are not participants in making the laws which govern the institution's activities.

Second, a further discussion of the "evangelical test" proviso, which restricts active management and control of the Y.M.C.A. work to members of Protestant churches.

Third, plans for the advancement of the "men and religion" forward movement, a campaign which is to be set in motion in September, 1911, and continue thru May, 1912. During that time it is hoped to bring to Christ and the other 100,000 men and boys, to double the enrollment of the Bible classes, and to add a conclusive testimony to the essential reality of Christian unity.
