The aggregate amount involved in the three contracts is \$206,957, the contractors supplying everything. The total mileage involved is something in the neighborhood of thirty-two, and this is fairly evenly divided, according to Engineer James, among the three. A gratifying feature is that the contractors will as far as possible employ local labor, and the whole system, irrespective of the disposal works, will be completed by Jan. 1. the Chairman Reid of the fire and light committee is hopeful and anxious that it should be completed by Christmas Day.
