**MUST PRODUCE HAMILTON

### POSTMASTER GENERAL AND LAWYER.

**THE TWO SCHEMES MUST GO TOGETHER.**

City Engineer Rust has reported in favor of subways on Bloor-street, under the Grand Trunk and under the Canadian Pacific tracks, and the Dundas-street viaduct. He has also reported the cost of a high level viaduct connecting Bloor-street with Danforth-avenue, across the Don Valley. One is in the east and one is in the west, and the two will be connected by a bridge of great length, and giving the greatest relief to the congested traffic in the south of the city that we know of. It will also open up a lot of new land for building purposes within the city limits, and will probably save many thousands of dollars in the east to Toronto Junction, and will give these two towns, which must join the city at a very early day, their most direct avenue to Toronto.

**CHARITIES AND CORRECTION CONFERENCE.**  
To-morrow at 2 o'clock p.m. the eight Canadian conference on Charities and Correction will open its sessions in the educational building here. Its object is "to bring into closer relationship all those who are engaged in caring for the neglected and unfortunate classes in the community. It includes within the range of its discussions every phase of philanthropic work: the safeguarding of childhood; the custodial care of the feeble-minded; the sick and the in-

man; the reformation of criminals; the structure and discipline of prisons and other public institutions; the relief of distress and poverty in such a way as to avoid pauperism; in fact, anything that might be considered to be of benefit to the community are dependent upon their fellow for assistance or support."

As the cost of maintaining and carrying for the dependent and needy in the province is one of the chief items of Ontario's annual expenses, the cost of Ontario's almshouses involves an expenditure of about \$1,500,000, and at least as much more for the remainder of the Dominion, it is evident there is both scope and need for this kind of work.

It is among those who are engaged in this important social work or have made it matter of study and observation, that real progress can be made along the lines which form the basis of the conference. It is fitted to secure the ends in view. The conference is intended to promote discussion, and in this program has been arranged which covers the features to which allusion has

been placed in the philanthropic work with the Jewish Relief Fund.

Without doubt deserve assistance and encouragement from free exchange of views and opinions, and it is to be hoped the conference will be largely attended.
