A German Baron Caught on This Side With Much Money on His Person.

New York, May 6.—The steamer Fulda's passenger, who shipped as Edward Green, and who is really Baron Unterreiter, confessed to the immigration authorities to-day that he stole the 67,000 florins, of which he had been accused yesterday, and for which he has been detained. Baron Unterreiter says he is the son of a Jewish rabbi and that he stole 67,000 florins from his aunt. A money changer named Grum changed the money for him and introduced him to his son Edward, with whom Unterreiter traveled to Rome. There Unterreiter stole young Grum's passport, and left for the United States. With the vessel Unterreiter became very friendly with Baron Fava, the Italian Ambassador, and stole the money from him. They took an affectionate farewell of each other at the dock. Unterreiter had about \$25,000 left in a bag at his waist when taken into custody.
