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THE CITY'S CASE HUNG UP.

After reviewing the proceedings of the conference on Tuesday between the city and the Attorney-General in reference to the city's case against the Gas Company, we realize the fact that the city has been out-manoeuvred. What the city applied for was the fact of the Attorney-General to enter suit against the Consumers' Gas Company. What the city actually received was an ambiguous reply, which will have the effect of tying up the case for three months at least, and of probably prejudicing it subsequently. If Hon. Mr. Gibson had granted his fiat as requested, the suit could have been filed immediately, with a very fair prospect of having it heard on March 8 next. As it is, the matter hangs in limbo. For the city and the company are to confer to see if an agreement can be made to come to the proper constitution of the action. If such an agreement is impossible, then Mr. Gibson promises that he will either issue his fiat or have the Act of 1887 amended so as to remove all doubt as to the city's right to proceed independently with the action. The objections to the Attorney-General's decision are, first, that the inception of the action is delayed, and secondly, that the action becomes complicated and our rights prejudiced by reason of the act being amended while the case is sub judice. The Gas Company are merely sparing for time. The longer they can postpone the case the better for themselves. In a lawsuit time is always in favor of the defendant. Besides, there is no assurance that Mr. Gibson will be able to secure the amendment to the act, as promised. It would be by no means impossible for the Gas Company to put up such a lobby as would defeat the proposed amendment. The city, by consenting to Mr. Gibson's compromise, has to lose three or four months' time and run all these risks. Furthermore, by consenting to an amendment to the act at this stage, the city may be debarred itself from insisting on the cancellation of the company's charter, as it might otherwise be in a position to do when the facts are all before the court.

Why should the Attorney-General subject the city to all this delay, and these risks, when the whole trouble can be avoided by his joining with the city in the prosecution of the action? The case is eminently one for the Attorney-General to take up and prosecute. While the Privy Council has decided that the case would be properly constituted with the city of Toronto as plaintiff, our own Court of Appeal, or at least a member of the court, has intimated that the Attorney-General was the proper party to institute proceedings. The association of the Attorney-General, therefore, while it cannot prejudice our case, may materially facilitate its progress to the highest tribunal, if recourse to it should be again deemed necessary.

The ground we take is that the Attorney-General should not only willingly issue his fiat when requested by the city, but that he should proceed against the Gas Company upon his own initiative. It is a general principle of law that the Attorney-General is the proper party to see that all public statutes are enforced, and the act under which the city claims is a public act. Furthermore, in the Attorney-General is vested the enforcement of all public trusts.

Bystander falls lamentably to read the signs of the times. The world is moving rapidly in the direction of consolidation. The whole globe has been practically brought under the control of 4 or 5 powers. It is true at least that these 4 or 5 powers are the arbiters of peace and war. Universal peace is possible only when we have certain governing principles accepted by the whole world. Everything is moving towards the unification of the world and the elimination of disturbing and retrograde elements. The Boers of South Africa are one of these elements, and it has fallen to the lot of Great Britain to eradicate the evil. Canada is just as much interested as any other country in weeding out the disturbers of the world's peace. It is absurd to say the South African trouble is one with which Canada has nothing to do. This country could no more retain its independence than can the South African Republic or the Orange Free State. The force of circumstances compels us to throw in our lot with some one of the dominating powers. We cannot stand alone. Two courses are open to us: We can either go in as equals in the British Federation or we can assert our independence and retain it until we offend one of the great powers. When that contingency arises we would eventually be forced into an ignominious surrender. There is no doubt in the world as to which is the better course. We have wisely thrown in our lot with the British Empire, and we owe it to ourselves and the Empire to assume our share of the imperial responsibilities. No, Mr. Bystander, there is no escaping war in these days, but there is more safety and greater honor in our connection with the British Empire than there would be with any other nation in the world. Would we escape war if we were part of the United States? Would we escape war if we belonged to France or Germany? And where would we be if we stood alone?

This principle is universally admitted, and it is clearly laid down in the case of the Attorney-General v. The City of Dublin. This was an action brought by the Attorney-General on the information of one of the ratepayers against the city of Dublin under an Act of Parliament to compel the city to apply the moneys collected from the rates in the way indicated by the act. The case is exactly parallel with the one against the Consumers' Gas Company. The case is reported in Bight's New Reports, vol. 1. House of Lords. The duty and prerogative of the Attorney-General is thus defined by Lord Haldane, page 247:

"The right which the Attorney-General has to file an information is a right of prerogative. The King as parens patriae has a right by his proper officer to call upon the several courts of justice, according to the nature of their several jurisdictions, to see that right is done to his subjects, who are incompetent to act for themselves, as in a case of estates and other cases.
