TORONTO. Toronto, June 5.—The run at the city cattle market today was 83 loads, with 1,290 head of cattle, 386 sheep and lambs, 630 hogs and 540 calves. Trade was very active and the market higher all round. The demand for export cattle was particularly keen, everything in that class being picked up early at top prices. There were some very good qual-ity cattle offering, one or two very choice loads being as good as any seen in the market for some time. The T. Crawford arm received one very fine load, which sold at \$5 30. It was stated that the present condition of the old country markets did not warrant the advance in prices here, but the fact that shippers had to fill boat space already contracted for, was sufficient to account for the extra de-

The spurt in the export trade sent all the market up, and the local butchers have to get in the market early to get their supplies, with prices on the jump. Some very choice picked butcher cattle were bought at \$5. While these were the exception, the general run of butchers' prices were 10c to 15c higher than last

The stocker trade was unusually quiet, very little in this class offering, though there is a fairly steady market for good stockers and heavy feeders.

The sheep and lamb market was slow, with prices on the easy side.

The hog market is very firm, and 19c higher than last week.

TO COST \$10,000

Thrown from a Bicycle Which County Council Decides on a Structure at Plover Mills.

> The county council met yesterday afternoon. The chief matters of discussion were the reports of the special committees regarding the building of bridges at Plover Mills and at Sylvan. It was decided to build a new bride at Plover Mills, to cost not more than \$10,000. The matter of building a new bridge at Sylvan was not decided, as the committee did not come to an agreement with the County of Lambton. The full text of their report is as follows:

Niagara Falls, Ont., June 6.-Amos Sweitzer, of Toronto, 29 years old, was rescued from death at the brink of the American Fall at 2:06 o'clock yesterday morning by members of the Niagara Falls police and fire departments. The rescue forms one of the most thrilling incidents in the history

of Niagara Falls. It was about 1 o'clock that Sweitzer was discovered in the water about 500 feet back from the brink of the American Fall by colored waiters from Prospect Park before rettring. He was wading out from the shore. They called to him to come back, but he paid no attention to them.

Word was hurriedly sent to Patrolman Dennis Blake, on duty at the foot of Falls street, and he ran to the river front. Securing a long pole, he waded out into the river. Sweitzer took hold of it and attempted to drag Blake with him. Then, throwing the pole aside, he was upset by the current, and was carried swiftly toward the brink. Time after time he managed to regain his feet, but it was not intil he was within fifteen feet of the edge of the precipice and 35 feet out from the shore at Prospect Point, that he was able to withstand the course of the current, and stood knee-deep in the river, seemingly hesitating about taking the final step that would end his life.
