THE CARDINAL'S VIEWS.

HOLDING that the conscription law constitutes a fatal obstacle to recruiting for the priesthood, and for the staff of clerical teachers, Cardinal Bégin declares it thus creates an evil "much worse than that which it is alleged to attempt to remedy."

The evil which it is hoped the law will remedy (without dealing with the "alleged" part of the phrase) is the lack of men to take the place of the fallen and wounded and to fight the cause of humanity against the cursed Prussianism of Wilhelm and his militarist parasites.
