

MANY TO ATTEND CONFERENCE ON CHURCH UNITY

Church Communions in Three
Continents Have Accepted
Invitations.

POPE WAS CORDIAL

But Roman Catholic Church
Will Not Be Repre-
sented.

BOSTON, Aug. 14.—Acceptance by many church communions in Europe, Asia Minor and Africa of invitations to participate in the proposed world conference on faith and order was announced tonight in the report of a deputation appointed by the world conference commission to visit Europe and the Near East.

The deputation visited Athens, Smyrna, Constantinople, Sofia, Bucharest, Belgrade and Rome. In addition, Bishop Weiler and Dr. Rogers visited Alexandria, Cairo, Jerusalem and Damascus, and other members visited Paris, London, Bergen, Christiania and Stockholm.

In commenting on the refusal of the pope to appoint delegates to the conference, as previously called to this country, on the ground that world church unity should be achieved by other churches returning to the Catholic Church, the report says:

"The pope received us most cordially. The contrast between his personal attitude and his official attitude towards the conference was very sharp. One was irresistibly moved, the other irresistibly rigid. The pope himself emphasized the distinction."

Among the bodies accepting the invitation extended by the deputation were the governing synod of the Greek Church, the Orthodox Church synods of Turkey, Bulgaria, Roumania, Serbia, Abyssinia and Palestine, the Church of Sweden and the Church of Norway. The Church of England had previously agreed to participate in the conference.

The members of the deputation recommended that a preliminary meeting for organizing and arranging for the conference be held at The Hague as soon as possible "after an opportunity had been given to the churches of Russia and Germany and such other churches as have not yet been approached to appoint representatives."

The commission has been notified of the proposed participation in the conference by many other church bodies in all parts of the world.

VISCOUNT GREY TO LEAVE FOR STATES EARLY IN SEPT.

LONDON, Aug. 14.—Viscount Grey, former secretary of state for foreign affairs, will leave for the United States to assume his post as temporary ambassador, probably early in September. He will be accompanied by Sir William G. Tyrrell. A large staff also will go with the ambassador to take routine affairs out of his hands, thus permitting Lord Grey to devote his time to larger questions.

Viscount Grey, whose health had been a subject of concern, now is enjoying excellent health.

Sir William Tyrrell was private secretary to Viscount Grey for eight years, retiring in 1915. He visited the United States in the fall of 1918 to discuss the Mexican situation with the Government.

KITCHENER PLANT TO BUILD 200 HOMES FOR ITS EMPLOYEES

KITCHENER, Aug. 14.—Mayor Gross announced here today that the finance committee of the city council would recommend the appointing of a housing commission to enable local industries to build houses for their employees under the Ontario housing act. The Dominion Rubber Industries will build 200 houses.

Explosion In Elevator Has Made Problem

Sixty Million Bushels Wheat
For Overseas Must Be
Sent by Rail.

MONTREAL, Aug. 14.—The destruction of the great government elevator at Port Colborne will mean the shipping to Montreal by train of some sixty million bushels of wheat for transshipment overseas, and in order to provide for the efficient handling of this increased traffic, the Grand Trunk Railway is going to put in two new railway sidings on the waterfront.

BELGIAN-DUTCH TREATY CLAIMS STILL CLASH

Neither Side Prepared To
Change Views Regarding
Scheldt River.

MAY BE A COMPROMISE

Belgian Case Has Been Pre-
sented — Dutch To Be
Heard Later.

PARIS, Aug. 14.—(By the Associated Press.)—The Belgian delegates have finished the presentation of their case before the commission which is considering the treaty of 1839. The Dutch representatives are to be heard on the subject August 20. In the meantime the commission will take a recess.

Although nothing has transpired thus far concerning possible concessions by either Belgium or Holland, it can be said on good authority that the Belgians still are firm in their demands and are likely to remain intransigent on that point even if later they may be disposed to modify their territorial demands.

The Dutch view is understood to be unchanged regarding the Scheldt, which they are willing to be free for navigation in times of peace only. They insist that they cannot consider any revision of the treaty involving modification of their boundaries. The final issue probably will come with the Belgians stoutly maintaining their demand for the opening of the Scheldt and the Dutch refusing any cession of territory. A compromise between these two viewpoints, however, is considered probable.

STRIKE LEADERS REFUSED BAIL IN WINNIPEG

Eight Men Charged With Con-
spiracy Must Stay in
Custody.

BROKE THEIR PROMISES

Judge Says Former Breach of
Faith Precludes Giving
Bail Now.

WINNIPEG, Aug. 14.—Bail was refused the eight Winnipeg strike leaders by Mr. Justice Cameron of the court of appeal today. The accused, William A. Heaps, R. B. Russell, John Queen, A. C. Johns and George Armstrong, the Royal Northwest Mounted Police, and escorted to the provincial jail, where they will remain until they appear for trial at the October sittings, unless the defence counsel can obtain their freedom from one of the judges in the higher courts.

Mr. Justice Cameron refused to grant bail on the ground that the eight leaders had broken their promises when released on bail the first time to abstain from taking an active part in labor unrest; that they had by public speeches and other activities carried on a campaign of an indiscreet nature. He did not feel like taking the responsibility of admitting them to bail. E. J. McMurray had pointed out that these public utterances had been made in order to raise the necessary funds for defence. He does not deny of getting bail for his clients, but says that success is doubtful.

PRINCE INVITED TO VISIT NEW HAMPSHIRE

PORTSMOUTH, N. H., Aug. 14.—Governor Bartlett telegraphed the Prince of Wales at St. John, N. B., tonight an invitation to visit New Hampshire "on any date which you are able to fix."

WELLAND CANAL WORKERS AGREE TO 8-HOUR DAY

Dominion Government's Offer
Accepted and Strike Is
Averted.

A SACRIFICE OF PAY

Men Now Working Ten Hours
Will Draw Two Hours
Less Pay.

ST. CATHARINES, Aug. 14.—The first offer of an eight-hour day by the Dominion Government was placed tonight before a mass meeting of workers of all trades engaged on the Welland ship canal and accepted, thus obviating the strike.

The reopening of negotiations resulted in the calling of tonight's meeting and acceptance of the offer means that men now working ten hours will sacrifice two hours' pay daily until such time as hourly rates can be increased. Telegrams were received from the minister of labor and from President Tom Moore of the Dominion Trades Congress at Ottawa after conferences with Hon. Dr. Reid, minister of railways and canals, stating that the rates of pay now prevailing on the hydro canal would be paid on ship canal work without exception, that should the men be required to work overtime, time and a half would be paid, but that this was not a rush job like the hydro canal and where men desired to work over eight hours the new regular hourly rate only would be paid.

The meeting was also informed that the appropriation of two million dollars for the post-war resumption of the work was almost exhausted, and no matter whether the men accepted the new offer of the Government or not unless a new appropriation was granted by Parliament the work would shut down on each section on the following dates: Section 1, October 31, 1919; section 2, September 15, 1919; section 3, September 15, 1919; section 5, October 31, 1919.

The question of making new rates of pay retroactive to May 1 similarly to the work was also relinquished, officers of the federation stating that they had been unable to get the department to agree to compromise for back pay to June 1, the department would agree only to making them retroactive to July 1, and applicable only to men now employed on the work.

This was also accepted, it being explained that the back pay would mean \$50 a month.

Three Children Killed When Airplane Hits Fence at Baltimore

BALTIMORE, Md., Aug. 14.—Three children were killed in Paterson Park today when an airplane of the 88th Aero Squadron, stationed at Langley Field, Va., crashed into a fence behind which were several hundred spectators. Seven were injured.

DEPUTY SHERIFF LURED FROM BED AND MURDERED

Wife Witnessed Killing of Her
Husband—Rum-Runners
Suspected.

TOLEDO, Ohio, Aug. 14.—Awakened from his sleep and lured outside of his home on the pretext that a rope was needed with which to tow an automobile that had broken down, Dean Trabbic, deputy sheriff of Erie, Mich., was shot and killed from ambush by four men at an early hour today.

Toledo rum runners are suspected, although the authorities have no clues other than the fragmentary descriptions furnished by Mrs. Trabbic, who witnessed the murder from an upstairs window of her home.

Airplane Contest To Develop Super Types of Planes

LONDON, Aug. 14.—The British Government will offer prizes amounting to \$24,000 for airplane competition in order to develop safer types of machines, Maj.-Gen. J. E. B. Seely of the air ministry announced in the House of Commons today. The prizes will be distributed among three classes of aircraft, small airplanes and seaplanes. Details of the competition, the general added, will be announced in a few days.
