Ottawa, Dec. 27.—The death of Arthur Gladu opens another seat in the House of Commons. The writ issued on Friday for a by-election in West Peterboro would have filled the last vacancy. Now, there will also have to be a by-election in Yamaska, the constituency which Mr. Gladu represented in the House of Commons.

Last election Yamaska was contested by two Opposition candidates, Mr. Gladu being elected by 3,148 to 464.

Under the terms of a recent statute a writ for a by-election has to be issued within six months of the seat becoming vacant.
