#### NOTE AND COMMENT

There seems to have been some mistake in the information given to Reuter on Wednesday, for neither the London representative of Mr. Hugh D. Mackintosh, who promoted the Burns and Squires contest, nor Mr. Sam Fitzpatrick, Johnson's manager, could confirm Reuter's message that Burns and Johnson had been matched. Both on Wednesday night stidit again yesterday we wired to Mr. Fitzpatrick for the terms upon which the match had been made, and yesterday we received his reply as follows:

"We know nothing about a match being arranged in Australia with Burns. Johnson ig matched to meet Schreck, at the National Sporting Club, next month. If Burns is sincere, Johnson will sail for Australia immediately after the Schreck match and meet Burns on the following conditions: Divide the purse 60 per cent. to the winner and 40 per cent, to the losers, or let the winner take the lot; and if Burns is on his feet at the end of the twentich round he to be declared the winner."

The representative of Mr. Hugh Mackentosh informed us that he hed winder.

If he had given me a reply I should have cabled and let my people settle the matter.

"When I asked Burns his terms to go to Australia, he at once gave me his figure. I cabled this to Australia; the reply came back to accept. I did so, and the business was done at once. But these leads not know their own minds. My people are business people, and to show you now they do things, I may mention that when there was a difficulty about getting, a place in Sydney for the Burns-Squires match, they bought ground, erected a stadium with accommodation for 15.000 people, and there the contest came off. I shall tell them at once not to trouble any longer about Johnson. He does not want to fight."

So here is the end of the story that Burns and Johnson had at last been matched. We can only suppose that the promoters, having been able to see their way to giving Burns his money, relied upon Johnson's oft-repeated wish to get an opportunity to meet Burns, and published, the information prematurely.
