

## DEVELOPMENT PROVES MINES IN PORCUPINE

Camp Will Not Be Hurt by Throwing Up of O'Brien Option.

The mining outlook is most favorable. Development is proving up some of the prospects to be most profitable mines, and free gold has been found on a number of properties within the past few days where development work is being done. No appreciable damper has been placed on the camp by reason of the O'Brien's having thrown up the option on the Miller property, or by the Miller's refusing to extend the option. Some people are glad to see the diamond drill go, as it is not nearly so good a test of a property as a shaft, the quicker and with the O'Brien's was imperative, as their option was so very short. On the Timmins property the shaft is now down 28 feet. It is a huge shaft, showing a wall of quartz the whole distance down. There is free gold on the surface very much oxidized.

There is free gold at the bottom of the pit in the sulphides and distinguishable with the naked eye in the pyrite. It is the fact that gold is found in the sulphides at depth which is the hope of the camp. This is the most satisfactory feature of it to mining engineers. It is true that refractory ore has been found at depth, but it has also been found near the surface on the Miller claim. These are only matters for treatment and milling. It is satisfactory to know that the ore is there, and that there is every probability of the camp number one some of the world's greatest gold mines.

Refractory ore gives the whole field stability. If it was all free there would be no reserve, and little probability of it continuing to depth. I saw the surface showings on the Timmins property and the showings of gold over a large area which was indeed remarkable. Their shaft is sunk on one side of their vein or dyke and shows oxidized iron and free gold on the surface, and no real mining has yet begun. An immense lead was found while trenching, and has been stripped for 50 feet. This shows free gold on the surface, and the dirt covering the rock is saved and put into boxes and pans good gold values. A hind vein has been caught in one of the shafts four feet down and is widening. This shows native gold in the sulphides. Everybody is most optimistic.

Poley and O'Brien have purchased nine claims north of the Miller property. It is said they own the Davidson property near to Bannerman, and that the option on the Miller property has not been taken up, no hint has been thrown out that they are dissatisfied with the camp. The fact that the Miller's of pounds, among the largest gold men in the world, who have their engineering, Mr. McLaren, on the ground a gentleman who has acted as an assistant to Prof. Gellie of Glasgow University, one of the most eminent geologists of the day, are here in the camp and have acquired the Bannerman property, together with the fact that all the mining engineers of Cobalt and other parts of Ontario speak hopefully for the permanency of the camp, dispels any ill-feeling engendered by the O'Brien's not having taken up the option on the Miller property, which appears to be the great theme of the "timber" press. The fact that the metallurgist and the largest mill man in America, has been in the camp, and is favorably impressed. There will be no shipping ore from the Shumagin gold fields of Porcupine. It will be all treated by stamps and milling, and already some of the biggest men in America and England are giving it their consideration. The outlook is most optimistic and the results so far very satisfactory.

"In the liabilities amounting to \$9000, is included the total amount due on all expenditures on the company's properties at Gowanda."
