In some quarters it is believed that Mrs. Gunnes may have known something of the murder of the five people, as it is not considered likely that so many could have been buried in her yard without her, at some time, becoming familiar with the fact. There have been rumors that Jennie Olsen Gunnes had knowledge of the manner n which the first husband of Mrs Gunnes came to his death in Chicago It is known that Holdgren had loaned \$1,500 to Mrs. Gunnes, and that he had another \$1,500 in his possession just prior to his death. It is considered probable that he was killed by Mrs. Gunnes or by Lamphere, or by both of them, in order to procure the cash he had and to avoid the necessity of repaying the loan he had


