r, about 8 inches plant from plant, at the time of corn planting; pt free from grass and weeds as corn is, but without as much eing--it ripens irregularly, therefore when the lower seed is own, it must be cut, and on a cloth near hand, beaten with a k to knock off the dry ones; bind the remainder in small bunden quite ripe, thresh again, opening the bundles; secure the ms for lint, from being stained by the weather, and clean the ed with a common fanning mill or in the ordinary way.

Hemp is almost the only plant employed in agriculture, in ich the male and female flowers are on different plants; this cirnstance has some influence on its culture and management.—hen it is grown, for both fibre and seed, it is the usual practice male plants as soon as the seed is set in the others. In England the female plants require 4 or 5 weeks to a their seed.

LOUGHING GREENSWARD.—The best seasons to plough answard are May and August; the ploughing should be at the test possible period before sowing in the spring.
