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HON. WM. PUGSLEY DEFINES THE VALLEY RAILWAY SITUATION

Government Desire Definite Proposition and are Willing and Anxious to Take Up the Matter—Tariff Question—Hon. Mr. Landry in Senate Denies Scene at Spencerwood

Ottawa, Nov. 16.—The position of the federal government in regard to the St. John River Valley Railway project was clearly defined by Hon. Wm. Pugsley in the house of commons this afternoon.

Senator Landry received a reply that there would be no change in procedure, but that in the past such guest would be given the place to which the lieutenant governor believed him entitled.

Mr. Pugsley said in reply to the speech from the throne was moved by Senator C. W. Ross, who spoke strongly for a navy bill in Canada.

Mr. Pugsley—Not directly, but the railway company asked me to arrange a conference. The rest of the session, which was very brief, lasting only two hours, was occupied with introduction of several bills.

Mr. Miller introduced a bill to suppress the business of betting and gambling on race tracks. Replying to a question as to the cement merger, Hon. Mr. Pugsley announced that the government intended to introduce legislation making more effective the law dealing with combinations.

Low Tariff Sentiment. Low tariff sentiment from the agricultural western provinces will be voiced during this session of the dominion parliament.

DILLON IS TO BE HANGED ON FRIDAY

Governor-General Declined to Re-grive Book Agent Murderer

(Montreal Herald.) John Dillon is to be hanged on Friday. Following the advice of the cabinet, the governor-general has declined to interfere in the case, and the law will take its course.

The case of Dillon was one of the most protected heard in the Montreal criminal courts. For nineteen months Dillon, alias Smith, has been in the public eye, accused of the murder of Constable Shea, and the wounding of Constable Foucault, and Chief Detective Carpentier.

The central police station was warned, and a body of seventy men surrounded the house, while firemen flooded it with water. But Dillon did not give way until a fight for hours he held the force at bay, banging away at intervals with his gun.
