Hanover, N. H., March 8.—A broad jump of 23 feet 2 1/4 inches, said to be the best indoor performance of which there is an available amateur record, was made by Captain Harry T. Worthington of the Dartmouth College track team in an exhibition event here today. Another record performance was made by Earl J. Thomson, a freshman from Long Beach, Cal., in an exhibition 45-yard high hurdles event, his time of six seconds equalling the world's amateur indoor mark. Thomson is the national amateur junior hurdle champion. Both performances were features of the Dartmouth interscholastic track meet.

Huntington School of Boston won the meet, with thirty-two points; Colby Academy had twenty-four; Hebron School, fifteen; and Tilton Seminary, Academy sixteen; Lyon English High eleven.

Gets Option on Cardinals
An option on the St. Louis National Baseball Club was obtained by James C. Jones, attorney for the club, the other afternoon when he gave Mrs. Helen E. Britton, owner, a check for \$25,000 as earnest money. Sixty days was allowed in which to make a payment of \$150,000 on the purchase price of \$350,000. Mr. Jones said, however, that he would not make the second payment, unless \$250,000 is available at the end of the sixty-day period.

Mr. Jones said John K. Tener, president of the National League, would confer with the promoters of the new company in St. Louis this week.

"While I have no right to speak for the incoming directors," Mr. Jones declared, "I think there will be no change in the team management. Miller Huggins will continue in charge. Herman Seekamp will continue to manage the business affairs of the club at the park.

May Pass Up Montreal
Syracuse, N.Y., March 8.—The question of an International League baseball franchise for Syracuse has been discussed at a conference here between John F. Farrell, president of the New York State League, and Secretary of the National Board of Minor Leagues, Edward B. Barrow, president of the International League, and President Charles Chapin, of the Rochester Club of that league.

President Farrell has agreed to release the Syracuse territory to the International League in 1918, under conditions which were not made public. Mr. Barrow and Mr. Chapin promised to transfer the franchise either of Montreal or Providence to Syracuse in that year, if proper support were assured in Syracuse.

Plans at first were discussed for the change this year, but because the schedules of both leagues are practically completed, and most of the players under contract, it was decided to postpone action until next year.

Hobbitel Not Yet Signed

Hobbitel, Boston Red Sox first baseman, said that he had not decided to sign a 1917 contract yet, and that he did not know whether he would sign a contract at all.
