**RAMIFICATIONS OF BOLOISM GROW IN NUMBER DAILY**

Charge of Blackmail Laid Against Senator Humbert of Le Journal; Prisoner His Accuser

Paris, Nov. 6.—The investigation of what has become known as "Boloism," in all its ramifications, which grew in number daily, is progressing slowly. Masses of testimony are being brought out, however, and the newspapers are printing columns of matter daily in a vain endeavor to keep pace with these developments, and are giving space to interviews with new persons brought in on account of direct or indirect connection with one or other of the cases centered around Le Journal.

Today's principal developments were two in number, Senator Humbert of Le Journal, announced that he had waived his parliamentary immunity in respect to the charge made against him by Pierre Lenoir, the former employee of the censorship bureau accused of trading with the enemy. Lenoir himself was brought out from his cell into court to complete the formalities in the laying of this charge, which is one of blackmail against Senator Humbert, Jean Leymarie and Captain Ladoux.

Leymarie was a high official in the ministry of the interior, who figured in an unauthorized return of a check taken from M. Duval, director of the Bonnet, Louvre, before Duval's arrest on the charge of supplying the enemy with information. Captain Ladoux was one of Lenoir's superiors at the telegraphic censorship bureau.

Threatened by Senator.

Lenoir alleges that these three got him into Leymarie's office at the ministry of the interior and there threatened to denounce him as a deserter unless he agreed to sell his shares in Le Journal to Senator Humbert.

The judicial authorities are unable to open an investigation into these charges until the senate votes authorization, which in view of the senator's consent will be a matter of form.

The second development is a despatch from the Petit Journal's correspondent at Zurich, stating that the other directors of the Schaashausen and Derendingen spinning mills, alarmed at the revelations of Arthur Schoeller's connection with the Lenoir case, called upon Schoeller for an explanation, and in the presence of M. M. Koch and Hoffmann, representing the company, Schoeller admitted that the sum of \$500,000 francs resulted to Lenoir for the purchase of Le Journal was of German origin and destined to uphold German economic interests for the after-the-war campaign. The admission, according to the despatch, was accompanied by Schoeller's resignation of his directorship in the company.

A collateral development came today in the action of the committee of the syndicate of the Parisian Press a professional organization, which includes the managing editors of the principal newspapers irrespective of their political opinion in passing unanimously a strongly worded resolution protesting against their government's treatment of L'Action Francaise in connection with the "pretended plot against the state."

The organization renews its previous protest against abuses of the censorship, which by stopping the publication of official documents issued by the Allied countries, keeps public opinion in ignorance of essential facts of the war.

The remarks were made by Keeler on the court house steps while the drafted men were receiving comfort kits. Keeler was roughly handled before breaking through the crowd and escaping to his office where he was attacked on his office as planned, he managed to evade the angry crowd and hurriedly left town with his family in a motor car.

**CHATHAM ALDERMEN ON BRIBERY CHARGE**

Chatham, Nov. 6.—The trial of Aldermen F. H. Brisco, F. E. Baxter and C. S. Coatsworth, members of the council, accused of conspiracy to solicit a bribe of \$5,000 from the Chatham Gas Company, were placed on trial today at the court house, when P. S. Coate, one of the many witnesses for the prosecution, took the stand and related the alleged negotiations that had been entered into by the company officials and the three councillors. He testified that the aldermen had originally favored the proposition whereby the city proposed to purchase the electrical business of the company. Later, he said, Aldermen Coatsworth and Brisco had informed him that \$50,000 was too much to pay and they suggested \$30,000 to \$35,000 as more suitable. In response to a message over the telephone, he had gone to see Ald. Baxter, who said that they wanted some consideration for their vote, and if this was given they would burn the petitions which had been largely signed by rate-payers protesting against the deal. Later, the witness said, he had informed Mayor Kerr of the plan and it was decided to catch the aldermen.

A meeting was arranged with Ald. Coatsworth, when Mr. Coate said that the former said that they wanted \$30,000 to be split equally between them. City Clerk Merritt also gave evidence respecting the proposed deal and many other witnesses will be called by the Crown and the defence.
