TO LICENSE THE FLOUR MILLS

Ottawa, Nov. 20.—On and after December 1 it will be illegal for any person, firm, corporation or association to operate, without a license from the food controller, any flour mill in Canada having a daily capacity of 100 or more barrels. Licenses are optional in the case of mills with a lesser daily capacity than 100 barrels, but may be granted upon application, in which case such mills will be subject to the same rules as those upon whom the licensing provisions are compulsory. Licenses may be suspended or revoked in case of violation of any of the food controllers' regulations.

MODERATE SETBACK AT STOCK MARKET OPENING

New York, Nov. 21.—(Wall Street)—Recessions of a point or more in leaders like United States Steel, Marine preferred, Union Pacific and C. & P. R. caused a moderate set back at the opening of today's stock market. General Motors also showed further pressure, losing almost two points. Equipments parted with some of the previous day's gains, likewise, coppers. Advances of fractions to a point were restricted mainly to inactive specialties.

NOON REPORT

New York, Nov. 21.—Led by Pennsylvania, which dropped 1 1/2 points to the new minimum of 46, the list yielded slowly in the first hour. Other falls included initial reversals with steel, coppers, shippings and oils. Offsetting features included issues of a more speculative character, notably Alcohol, Distillers, Central Leather and Hide and Leather preferred. Prices strengthened substantially later, the rally coinciding with the encouraging British war report, but Italian exchange recorded a further collapse.

LONDON STOCK MARKET

London, Nov. 21.—The stock market maintained a steady tone today, but apart from a rally in Argentine rails, on better labor news, and a hardening in shipping, munitions, iron and steel shares under a good demand, there were no special features to the day's movement. Prices were followed by a material set back all around.

THE CORN MARKET

Chicago, Nov. 21.—Uncertainty over transportation difficulties and prospects of new restrictions in trading had a depressing effect today on the corn market.
Not even the news of the smashing of the Hindenburg line seemed sufficient to stir dealers into activity. Balties took place, but were not of much moment. Opening quotations, which ranged from 1/4 cent off to 1/2 cent advance, with January at 1.18 and May at 1.16 1/2 to 1.17, were followed by a material set back all around.

BRITAIN ALL RIGHT FOR FOOD FOR SELF BUT MUST SUPPLY FRANCE AND ITALY

London, Nov. 20.—The situation as regards food stocks in the United Kingdom, Baron Rhonda, the food controller, says is better than at this time last year, but the country now had to supply France and Italy. If it were only a question of supplying Great Britain, he said, he thought compulsory rationing would be needless.

CHEAP AND BETTER

Rockefeller Institute Announces Discovery of Salvarsan Substitute
Philadelphia, Nov. 21.—Dr. Simon Flexner, head of the Rockefeller Institute, today told the National Academy of Science in convention here that the Rockefeller Institute had discovered an improved substitute for salvarsan.

"The new chemical has many advantages over salvarsan," said Dr. Flexner. "Where salvarsan costs \$3.50 a dose, the improved substitute costs about five cents a dose."

NORWEGIAN VESSEL HITS MINE; 10 MEN DROWNED
Trondhjem, Norway, Nov. 20.—The salvage steamer Strödder, struck a mine near Polla today, and sank. The crew of ten men was lost.

Canada's Trade Shows Many Millions Gain

Ottawa, Nov. 21.—An increase of approximately \$278,000,000 for the first seven months of the fiscal year ended with October, as compared with the same period last year, is shown in the trade statement for October.
For the seven months the trade in the Dominion totalled \$1,384,616,298, as compared with \$1,106,616,298 last year. For October alone Canada's trade amounted to \$288,834,221. In October 1916 it aggregated \$164,800,179.
