HUNS KILLED WOUNDED

Bayoneted Medical Officer and His 17
Patients Though Unprotected.

News of the bayonetting by the Huns
 of Dr. Haight of the C.M.R. while in his
 dressing dug-out caring for the wound-
 ed is told in a letter just received by
 Crown Attorney J. Seymour Corley
 from Capt. M. M. Crawford, Ontario
 Military Hospital, Orpington. Dr.
 Haight was the cousin of Chas. Smyth,
 an honor graduate of Osapode Hall,
 who is connected with the Crown At-
 torney's firm. Capt. Crawford writes:
 "Let me warn you never to trust any-
 thing with even a smell of German about
 him. There is only one good German,
 and that is a dead one, but make sure
 that even he is dead before you trust
 him. On the 2nd of June, when our Can-
 adians last some of their front trenches,
 they had to leave behind Dr. Haight of
 the C. M. R.'s who was in his dressing
 dug-out caring for the wounded and ab-
 solutely unprotected. When our boys
 retook the trenches on June 11 they
 found Haight bayoneted to death, as
 were also the seventeen wounded he had
 in the station with him. This is but one
 illustration of the dastardly Hun, and
 we are all resolved here, as I hope they
 are in Canada, to fight the cur to his
 absolute death."

"We have about 400 wounded here,
 mostly direct from France, a little of
 everything, even two Russians. There
 are a good number of Canadian boys,
 and even in their trials and wounds you
 cannot imagine what a cheerful lot they
 are. I have one chap minus a right eye,
 left leg and a bunged up right arm. He
 said to me today: 'My arm will come
 all right. I never did need more than
 one eye. If I get an artificial leg I will
 be as good as new.' How in Heaven's
 name can anyone expect to beat an army
 that feel that way about it?"
