CANADIAN MINERAL EXPANSION IS SEEN

Boston Financier Says at Winnipeg Moneyed Men Favor Dominion

WINNIPEG, Jan. 14.—"Today, that part of the financial world which is interested in the developments of mineral resources, is looking to Canada to undergo a tremendous development," declared H. A. Wentworth, financier, of Boston, Mass., during an address at a meeting of the Manitoba Chamber of Mines here. Mr. Wentworth declared financial interests were interested in the Dominion, not only because of its physical possibilities, "but because of the character of its government and people, from whom everyone can expect a square deal."

Domer Chosen Head Of French Senate

PARIS, Jan. 15.—Paul Domer, former Minister of Finance, yesterday elected president of the French Senate, succeeding M. de Seives, who was defeated in last Sunday's election. M. Domer is a Radical, which group now controls the presidencies of both the Senate and the Chamber. Fernand Bouisson, representing the extreme Left, was elected president of the Chamber Tuesday.

CANDIDATES MEET IN JOINT DEBATE

Duff Denies Rum Traffic Charges Made by Rhesus in N. S. Campaign

MULGRAVE, N. S., Jan. 15.—William Duff, Lunenburg, Liberal candidate in the Antigonish-Guysboro by-election to be held next Tuesday to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Hon. J. C. Douglas and Dr. W. H. Rhesus, of Bridgewater, member of the provincial government without portfolio, met in joint debate here today.

The high spot of the debate was reached when Dr. Rhesus made special charges against Mr. Duff in relation to the rum traffic. The charges were categorically denied by the former Deputy Speaker of the Federal House.

BIG DISTILLING OUTFIT IS SEIZED

BANGOR, Me., Jan. 14.—A complete distilling outfit, one of the largest ever known in operation in this section was discovered today by county and federal officers in a cottage at Hermon Pond, 10 miles out. Charles Boudreau, said to be the owner of the cottage, and Edmund Tardiff, both of Bangor, with long court records for liquor cases, were found in the cottage, arrested and are locked up.

The equipment consisted of two large stills, one heated by hard coal and the other by kerosene, with a complete piping and cooling system having a capacity of 30 gallons of alcohol a day. A quantity of mash was found but no finished product. The place was dismantled and the equipment made a load for a big truck.
