NOMINATION FOR COUNTY IS FILED

Papers For Hon. J. B. M. Baxter in By-election Placed With Sheriff.

The proclamation for the by-election in Saint John county, made necessary by Hon. J. B. M. Baxter, acting as the prothonotary of the provincial government, was issued today by Sheriff A. A. Wilson, returning officer for the county.

Nomination day will be Saturday, September 26, and the sheriff will hold his court from 10 to 12 of that morning, Atlantic Standard time. Should there be no opposition, at noon the returning officer will declare Dr. Baxter elected. Should opposition develop and a poll be demanded the election will be held on Saturday, October 3, and the polls will be open from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., Atlantic Standard time. In the event of an election declaration day will be October 9. It was said today that the by-election will be held in the afternoon of Hon. Mr. Baxter was notified.

MORE MONEY IS IN

They're Paying Water Rates to be Within Discount Period.

Payments on the 1925 water rates were in about the same proportion to the assessment as in 1924. It was said this morning at the office of the city chamberlain but the cash received up to last night was in excess of the amount received during a like period of last year. The assessment for 1925 is \$22,573.70 more than it was for 1924. Up to last night there had been received \$87,889.92 as compared with \$79,483.97 up to the night of the 15th for 1924, an increase of \$8,405.95 for this year.
