PYTHIANS PAY HONOR TO HEAD OF ORDER HERE

Maritime Chief Feted by Saint John Lodge No. 30

LODGE OBSERVES 19TH ANNIVERSARY

Members of Order Urged to Work For Good of Maritimes

A complimentary banquet tendered to Grand Chancellor J. A. Mowry by his fellow-members of Saint John Lodge, No. 30, Knights of Pythias, last evening in their hall, Temple Building, Main street, was attended by about 200 Knights. Among the guests were three grand lodge officers from Moncton, four past grand chancellors, the members of grand lodge residing in the city and Knight R. W. Wigmore, representing Mayor Potts.

Past Chancellor S. W. McMackin was chairman and toastmaster and on his right at the head table were the guest of honor and Past Grand Chancellors Mr. Justice Grimmer, P. A. Godsoe, LeBaron Wilson and Bayard Stillwell. On the chairman's left were Knight Hon. R. W. Wigmore, who represented the city in the absence of Mayor Potts, V. C. of Saint John Lodge, B. W. Erb, Grand K. of R. and S. A. P. Gorbell, of Moncton, and Past Chancellor C. H. Blakney, of Moncton.

Loyalist Temple, No. 18, Pythian Sisters, under the convenship of Mrs. Walter Whitaker and Mrs. E. S. Waters served the banquet capably. The tables and rooms were decorated in the Pythian colors of red, yellow and blue.

CAPTAIN MOWRY HONORED.

During the evening B. W. Erb, on behalf of the lodge, presented a past chancellor's jewel to Captain Mowry and informed him that at the end of his term as grand chancellor his lodge would present him a past grand chancellor's jewel. Captain Mowry replied appreciatively.

The chairman recalled that Captain Mowry was a charter member of the lodge and always one of its hardest workers and he spoke with pride of the lodge which was instituted 19 years ago with 32 members, having now a membership of more than 400.

P. C. J. C. Mitchell proposed the toast to Captain Mowry after the toast to "The King had been honored. Mr. Mitchell paid high tribute to the guest of honor and described his pet schemes as being the establishment of the Home for aged Pythians in the Maritime Provinces and the "Pythian Senator."

On rising to reply to the toast, Grand Chancellor Mowry was given an ovation. He thanked the chairman and proposer of the toast for the nice things they had said about himself, and the lodge for tendering him the banquet, which he felt was not so much to the man as to the office. In all that he had done for the order he had only been doing his duty. He would to the best of his ability carry out the duties of the high office to which he had been elected, and with the aid of his grand lodge officers he felt something would be accomplished during the year and he would go out of office having filled it with credit to the order and to himself. It had been said by the proposer of the toast that he had two pet schemes, the home for aged Pythians and the "Senator." It was true he felt a great

deal of interest in these two propositions, and he hoped that every member of the order in the Maritimes would support these projects.

P. C. W. J. McAlary proposed the toast to the Order, Knights of Pythias of the Maritime Provinces. P. C. C. H. Blakney in his spirited reply said eloquent tribute to Captain Mowry and said he would like to add to the wording of the toast to which he was replying "and the challenge of the present Maritime situation to Pythians." He had attended the recent conference at Charlottetown and he referred to the previous Charlottetown conference which had resulted in Confederation. The Maritime Provinces had not got what Confederation was to have given them. Mr. Blakney declared that that now interest in the Maritime situation had been revived and there was a Dominion wide movement to have the Maritime Provinces realise the benefits they expected to receive from Confederation.

He exhorted Pythians to get behind this movement and see that the young men of today with the same blood and the same ability as the founders of these provinces might be able to stay here and develop the Maritime Provinces and not be forced to seek a livelihood in the West or across the border.

Others who spoke in reply to this toast were Mr. Justice Grimmer, Mr. Godsoe, Mr. Wilson, Mr. Gorbell, John Jenkins, past chancellor, C. W. Polkins, C. C. of New Brunswick Lodge, No. 1, W. A. Coleman, C. C. of Union Lodge, No. 2, and B. B. Brittain, C. C. of Carleton Tower Lodge, No. 37.

P. G. C. Bayard Stillwell proposed the toast to the City of Saint John and the toast to the Ladies was proposed by C. T. Green and replied to by J. Roy Bell.

Poison Prescribed To Cure Epilepsy

MOSCOW, Nov. 17.—Dr. Speransky, the famous Russian scientist, and Professor Pavlov, the noted physiologist, have announced their discovery of a cure for epilepsy.

Dr. Speransky has ascertained by experiments that an animal organism is able to produce a special poison when part of the brains of animals are artificially congealed.

This poison causes convulsions and fits, but by inoculating it in a healthy body the body becomes immune to convulsions.

Experiments so far carried out on dogs have proved satisfactory and Dr. Speransky claims that the same cure can be applied to human beings.

ENGLISH IN QUEBEC SHOW FURTHER LOSS

City Census Shows 619 Decrease in Two Years—French Gain

QUEBEC, Nov. 16.—Detailed figures issued at the City Hall, taken out of a municipal census completed last week by the city assessors, show another decrease of English-speaking population, as also has been noted in other sections of the province, especially in the Eastern Townships.

With a total population placed at 124,341, an increase of 7,862 over the last census taken in 1923, the increase goes exclusively to the French-Canadian population, the English-speaking registering a loss of 619 within that relatively small period.

By nationality and creed the population is now sub-divided as follows: French-speaking (Catholic), 119,876; French-speaking (Protestant), 115; English-speaking (Catholic), 5,864; English-speaking (Protestant), 5,486.

In the last census the figures given out for the English-speaking people were, respectively: Catholic, 6,029, and Protestant, 5,940. The last federal census figures in 1921 placed the population of this city at 95,000. Protest was raised as a result of alleged errors committed by the assessors, which resulted in the decision to hold a municipal census every two years.

Launching of Red Cross Canvass in the Business Section of City Planned

The launching of the Saint John Red Cross canvass of the business section of the city in a drive for \$2,000 was planned for at a special meeting of the executive and members of the men's committee held yesterday afternoon.

Mrs. I. F. Longley, president, was in the chair and spoke of the hope that the canvass of the business section of the city would bring in the funds necessary to carry forward the work this year, supplementing the proceeds of the membership drive carried out by the women.

\$1,400 EXPENDED LAST YEAR.

It was estimated about \$1,400 had been expended last year and that the funds had been entirely inadequate. The women's canvass had brought in about \$800 and approximately \$200 of that must go to the Provincial Red Cross. It was decided that the objective of the canvass must be \$2,000.

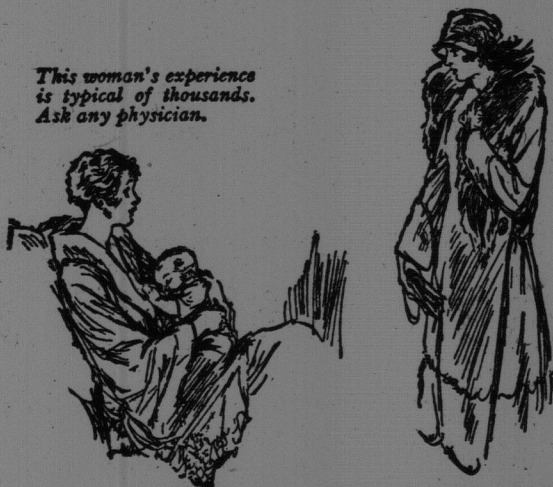

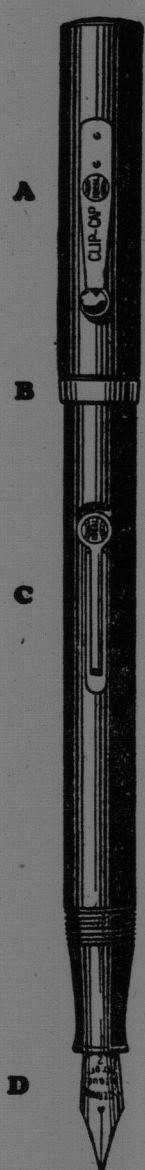

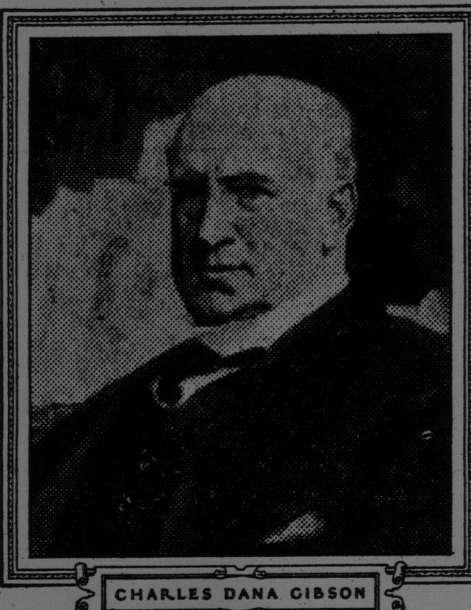
